### NOTICE OF COUNTERFEIT CURRENCY

The following counterfeit has been noted in circulation.

A \$50 note bears the insignia of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, N. Y., check letter and faceplate No. F-3, backplate No. 138, serial No. B-20322956A and series 1934. This note, of foreign origin and fair workmanship, is not particularly deceptive. Greyish tint appears on the face. Lines are missing from the cross-ruled background. Back of note is printed in dull dark-green ink.

## CALIFORNIA STATE PLANT QUARANTINES

Under plant quarantines and quarantine regulations promulgated by the State of California and approved by the United States Department of Agriculture, pursuant to the Terminal Inspection Acts of March 3, 1915, and June 4, 1936, embodied in section 35.28, Postal Laws and Regulations, the shipment into the State of California of certain designated plants and plant material, known to be carriers of injurious plant insects and plant diseases is regulated or entirely prohibited.

The following table gives a summary of the California quarantine laws and regulations, showing the quarantined areas, the plants and plant products affected, and the pests of which such plants are known hosts and postmasters are to be governed accordingly:

Shippers desiring California permits must make application therefor direct to the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, State Department of Agriculture, Sacramento, Calif.

Postmasters at places in California where State inspection of plants and plant products is maintained under the Terminal Inspection Acts shall be governed by the provisions of subparagraph (d) (2) of section 35.28, Postal Laws and Regulations, if parcels sent to such offices for terminal inspection are found to be in violation of these plant quarantine laws or regulations.

The foregoing will supersede instructions previously published in the POSTAL BULLETIN.

AMENDMENTS TO THE POSTAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS

VESSELS TO DELIVER LETTERS AT POST OFFICES BEFORE ENTRY

INSERT No. 528.

ORDER No. 52748; DATED JULY 31, 1952.

Amend § 125.4 *Vessels to Deliver Letters at Post Offices Before Entry*, to read as follows:

§ 125.4 *Vessels to Deliver Letters at Post Offices Before Entry.* No vessel arriving within a port or collection district of the United States shall be allowed to make entry or break bulk until all letters on board are delivered to the nearest post office, except where waybilled for discharge at other ports in the United States at which the vessel is scheduled to call and the Postmaster General does not determine that unreasonable delay in the mails will occur, and the master or other person having charge or control thereof has signed and sworn to the following declaration before the collector or other proper customs officer:

I, A. B., master \_\_\_\_\_, of the \_\_\_\_\_, arriving from \_\_\_\_\_, and now lying in the port of \_\_\_\_\_, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I have to the best of my knowledge and belief delivered to the post office at \_\_\_\_\_ every letter and every bag, packet, or parcel of letters which was on board the said vessel during her last voyage, or which were in my possession or under my power or control, except where waybilled for discharge at other ports in the United States at which the said vessel is scheduled to call and which the Postmaster General has not determined will be unreasonably delayed by remaining on board the said vessel for delivery at such ports.



And any master or other person having charge or control of such vessel who shall break bulk before he has . . . . arranged for such . . . . delivery or onward carriage shall be fined not more than \$100. (. . . . 18 U. S. C. 1699, as amended by Public Law 444, approved July 3, 1952.)

In § 137.62 *Salaries of Rural Carriers*, amend paragraph (e) to read as follows:

(e) *Heavily Patronized Routes.*—The Postmaster General may, in his discretion, allow and pay such additional compensation as he may determine to be fair and reasonable in each individual case to rural carriers serving heavily patronized routes not exceeding 45 miles in length: *Provided*, That the total annual compensation of a rural carrier serving a heavily patronized route of not exceeding 45 miles in length shall not exceed \$4,370, exclusive of maintenance allowance: *Provided further*, That a rural carrier below the maximum grade provided herein shall not be granted an additional allowance for serving a heavily patronized route in an amount that would exceed \$4,370 when added to the salary he would receive in the maximum grade. In case any such heavily patronized route is extended in length, the regular or temporary rural carrier assigned to such route at the time of such extension shall not be reduced in pay. (Sec. 17, 59 Stat. 455, as further amended by Public Law 442, approved July 3, 1952; 39 U. S. C. 867 (d).)

#### COMPENSATORY TIME OR OVERTIME IN LIEU THEREOF

In § 137.71, *Compensatory Time, or Overtime in Lieu Thereof*, amend subparagraphs (3) and (4) of paragraph (b) to read as follows:

(3) The Postmaster General may, if the exigencies of the service require, authorize the payment of overtime to employees other than supervisory employees whose base salaries, exclusive of longevity salary, are more than . . . . \$4,970 per annum, for services performed on Saturdays, Sundays, and Christmas Day during the month of December, in lieu of compensatory time.

(4) Supervisory employees shall be allowed compensatory time for services performed in excess of 8 hours per day, and those whose base salaries, exclusive of longevity salary, are more than . . . . \$4,970 per annum shall be allowed compensatory time for services performed on Saturdays, Sundays, and on Christmas Day during the month of December, within 180 days from the days such service was performed. (Sec. 3, 59 Stat. 435, as further amended by Public Law 888, approved December 27, 1950, and Public Law 494, approved July 10, 1952; 39 U. S. C. 853 . . . .)
