The 20-cent Horatio Alger commemorative postage stamp will be placed on sale April 30, 1982, in Willow Grove, PA. This stamp honors American author Horatio Alger on the 150th anniversary of his birth.

Do Not Sell Before May 1, 1982



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Issued in Panes of 50. Collector information will be found on page 11.

Supply. All post offices under the automatic distribution system will receive a supply of this stamp. However, some post offices will receive less than the normal distribution quantities automatically furnished on a 50-subject commemorative. Since the total quantity of this stamp is being distributed automatically, no supplemental requisitions will be honored at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing for Item 417.

Post offices requiring additional stamps in less-thanbulk quantities should immediately requisition them on a separate Form 17, Stamp Requisition, from their Stamp Distribution Office.—Customer Services Dept., 4-1-82.

Mail Within Pages of Other Mail

Employees are reminded not to place letters, flats, or other mail within the pages of magazines, catalogs, etc., at any time.—Delivery Services Dept., 4-1-82.

Retirement Application Processing

The Office of Personnel Management (OPM) is responsible for processing applications for retirement benefits and authorizing checks to retired employees. Inaccurate or incomplete retirement records from employing agencies greatly extend the time it takes OPM to process a retirement claim. The Postal Service recognizes that when an employee retires, any delay in receiving the regular annuity check could result in inconvenience or personal hardship to the employee. Consequently, every effort is made to process correct, completely documented retirement records to OPM as quickly as possible. A retiring employee can assist in this effort by filing the retirement application at least six weeks before the effective retirement date.

Installation heads must ensure that the notice to eligible employees contemplating retirement which appears on page 7 of this BULLETIN is posted on all bulletin boards on a permanent basis. Individuals involved in retirement counseling and retirement processing are urged to encourage employees considering retirement to file their retirement applications early.—
Employee and Labor Relations Dept., 4-1-82.

Issuance of Burial Flags

The Veterans Administration asks that VA Form 60-2008, Application for United States Flag for Burial Purposes, be completed and returned to the VA Regional Office at the close of business the same day that the flag is issued. Prompt return of this form can prevent payments being made in the name of deceased veterans. The VA is revising Form 60-2008 to reflect the need for prompt processing.—Rates & Classification Dept., 4-1-82.

TORT CLAIMS

The following addition to ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT MANUAL (ASM) 250 delegates to management sectional center managers or MSC manager/postmasters the authority to pay tort claims filed against the Post Service in amounts that do not exceed \$100. The effective date of these regulations is April 17, 1982. The ASM and Handbook M-19, Accident Investigations—Tort Claims will be revised accordingly. The major impact of this addition will be better service to the public and it will also save the costs of processing claims to the Postal Data Center for adjudication.

Personal Injury and Property Damage Claims \$100 or Less

Delegation of Authority To Pay Certain Tort Claims.

When the amount of claim is \$100 or less, the MSC manager or MSC manager/postmaster is authorized, except as noted in 254.272, to pay (but not deny) the claim after he determines that the damage claimed was caused by the negligent or wrongful act or omission of a postal employee while acting in the scope of employment. This delegation of authority is limited to the payment of claims made by the public for damages dent, a slip, trip, and fall accident, or similar occurrence.

2. Claims Which Cannot Be Paid.

The MSC manager or manager/postmaster is not authorized to pay:

a. Any claim arising out of the loss, miscarriage, or negligent transmission of letters or postal matter.

b. Any claim arising out of assaults, battery, false imprisonment, false arrest, malicious prosecution, abuse of process, libel, slander, misrepresentation, deceit, or interference with contract rights.

c. Any claim submitted by an agency of the United States.

d. Any claim submitted by an employee of the United States.

e. Any claim arising out of an accident in which the postal employee involved received workers' compensation or continuation of pay.

The above listed claims, which MSC Managers or managers/postmasters are not authorized to pay, and all tort claims which are recommended for denial, must be forwarded to the Postal Inspector, Inspector in Charge, or the Postal Data Center, as indicated in 254.21, .22, and .23.

More Than One Claim Arising, or Which May Arise, Out of a Single Accident.

The MSC manager or manager/postmaster may pay each claim presented, provided none of the claims, or the anticipated claims, exceeds the delegated authority of \$100.

4. Payment of Claims.

Payment of claims by the MSC manager or manager/postmaster will by made using account identification code 597 to support the account book entry. A summary report together with all supporting docu-

ments and exhibits is required to support the expenditure. (See Handbook M-19, Accident Investigation—Tort Claims.)

5. No Authority To Deny Claims.

The MSC manager or manager/postmaster is not authorized to deny any tort claim.

6. Assistance.

The MSC manager or manager/postmaster may contact the servicing Postal Data Center or the Regional Counsel for any assistance needed.—Law Dept., 4-1-82.

Cancelling Instructions—50-State Birds and Flowers Stamps

On April 14, the Postal Service will issue in Washington, D.C., a pane of fifty 20-cent commemorative stamps featuring the official birds and flowers of each of the 50 states. The stamps also will go on sale at all offices nationwide when the lobby opens on that same date. Besides the usual first day of issue cancellation to be provided in Washington, D.C., a special pictorial cancellation will be available in each state capital on April 14, and by mail order for 45 days following that date. Some collectors also may request the normal die-hub or hand cancellation from the state capitals and other cities for their covers.

Though it is important at all times to give special care to the processing and delivery of philatelic mail, postal employees should take extra precautions to avoid damage to covers to which the 50-State Birds and Flowers stamps are affixed. All stamped mail containing the Birds and Flowers stamps should be handled with extreme care, whether canceled by hand or machine. No markings, backstamping, delivery en-dorsements, or pen and dauber marks, other than the

requested cancellation should be applied.

Postmarking equipment always should be maintained in top operating condition, cleaned regularly, and properly dated so that sharp, legible cancellations

are provided for philatelic mail.

In order to properly serve customers who collect postmarks and canceled stamps, the hand-stamp postmark should lightly touch the stamp, with just enough pressure to cancel it.

Proper inking is essential—too much ink, as well as too little, can spoil a cover. Only black ink may be used unless the customer requests another color that is in regular use for postmarking at the processing

facility.

Philatelic pieces should not be used as either the top or bottom piece in a bundle of mail, wrapped tightly with a rubber band, or bent, folded, or rolled. Wrinkled or creased covers and those with torn or ragged edges lose their attractiveness and value.

For the Birds and Flowers stamps, customers may request a local hand-stamp cancellation or a local machine cancellation. The date on the local postmark must be the date on which the mail was received. Under no circumstances is this mail to be back dated.

You may apply the April 14 regular machine or hand cancellation only if requested to do so by customers

and only on a hand-back basis on April 14.

From state capital post offices customers also may request our special pictorial hand cancellation. This April 14 cancellation is also available for 45 days after the first day of issue by mail order.

All orders must contain envelopes bearing customer affixed stamps meeting at least the First-Class rate; Postal Service personnel will apply cancellations only.

Further details on the proper procedures for philatelic postmarking, including types of postmarks, permissible canceling devices, and hand-back service regulations, are contained in the Domestic Mail MANUAL (DMM) 164 and the Postal Operations Manual (POM) 244.—Customer Services Dept., 4-1-82.

Mail Fraud Information for Consumers

A special series of public service announcements has been developed and sent to every radio and television station in the country as part of the U.S. Postal Service's continuing effort to help consumers avoid mail fraud problems.

"Don't Take Getting Taken" is the slogan of these announcements which illustrate several kinds of mail fraud, but note that "Most of the time when you shop by mail you get what you were promised. But if you don't. . . ." It then directs consumers to call their Postal Inspector or local postmaster for assistance

when they suspect mail fraud.

In addition to the public service announcements, posters have been sent to the following post offices for display April 9 through June 30: CAGs A-H, Main Offices; CAG A, Stations and Branches; CAG B-H, Stations and Branches; CAG J and K, in Eastern and Central Regions. Posters will be distributed in two sizes, Poster 32, 24" x 36", or Poster 32A, 14" x 21".— Customer Services Dept., 4-1-82.

DOMESTIC FIRST FLIGHT CACHETS

Official cachet and philatelic treatment for the first flight services described in A and B, are authorized in 244.63 Postal Operations Manual.

To prepare and send covers for official philatelic treatment for these services, observe the following procedures:

1. Address all covers.

2. Applicable rate of postage per cover is 20 cents for the first ounce; 17 cents for each additional ounce up to 12 ounces.

3. Allow a clear space, 2½ by 2½ inches, on the lower portion of the envelope and to the left of the

address, for the cachet.

4. Provide an additional clear space of 1½ inches to the left of the innermost stamp to permit a clear postmark.

5. Include in each envelope a uniform enclosure of the approximate thickness of a postal card to assure a

good impression of the cancellation.

6. Enclose the prepared covers in another envelope and indicate segment desired by pencil notation in the

upper right hand corners of the covers.

7. Mail the covers to reach the office applying the cachet no later than three days before the scheduled date of the flight.

E-COM SERVICE

1. E-COM messages going to destinations within the Serving Post Office (SPO) delivery area have a 2-day service standard. E-COM messages entered at one SPO, but for delivery in the area served by another SPO, are subject to normal First-Class Mail delivery standards. The cut-off time for entry of committed E-COM is 12 midnight local (originating SPO) time. Service standard failures of E-COM letters should be reported to the originating SPO when they are detected. Refer to Postal Bulletin 21334 (1-14-82), p. 9 or Domestic Mail Manual (DMM) Chapter 5, E-COM Service, for a list of SPO delivery areas.

3. The following information should be included in any call to an SPO about service failures:

a. Date and time the letter was entered into the E-COM system.

b. Date that piece will be delivered.

c. Any identifiable reason for delay (e.g., back cancels, bad ZIP Code, etc.).

4. Under no circumstances is any mail piece to be subjected to further delay because of this reporting procedure.

5. E-COM messages are First-Class Mail and must be handled in accordance with DMM 137.271, 391.1, and 392.1.

6. The following is a translation of data codes found in the last two lines of information appearing in the Return Address Window:

1 Date letter was entered into E-COM Unit.

POSTAGE STAMP AFFIXER WARRANTY

Effective immediately, the warranty provisions of the Postage Stamp Affixer are changed. The warranty is for one year following either purchase or the receiving of a replacement affixer. Within the first 90 days of the warranty, a customer may have a defective affixer replaced—at any post office that sells affixers—by presenting the defective affixer and the original carton showing the round date (to verify the purchase date).

The retail clerk will give the customer an over-thecounter replacement and will round date the replacement unit carton with the current date, beginning a new warranty period. After the first 90 days, a defective unit is replaced by the manufacturer as provided for in the written warranty included with the Postage Stamp Affixer.

Associate offices and classified stations and branches are to return defective affixers to their respective Stamp Distribution Offices (SDOs). Use Form 17, Returned Stock, with the reverse side filled out in the same manner as when returning stamp stock. Return each unit in its original carton and clearly mark each carton "Defective".

Each SDO will accumulate defective postage stamp affixers and, at the end of each quarter, send them via registered mail to the manufacturer, Data-Link Corporation, P.O. Box 1145, El Cajon, California 92022. Prepare a cover letter in triplicate stating how many defective units are being returned and a self-addressed return penalty label for the manufacturer to use in mailing back the replacement units to the Stamp Distribution Office.

The SDO must not reduce stamp accountability when the defective Postage Stamp Affixers are returned to the manufacturer for replacement. Keep the triplicate copy of the cover letter and the registered mail receipt on hand. Forward the duplicate copy to the accountbook unit. The accountbook unit will establish a suspense file until the replacement affixers are returned to the SDO. If receipt of shipment is not reported in a reasonable time, determine the cause. When the replacement affixers are returned by the manufacturer, the SDO will date stamp their triplicate copy of the cover letter and forward it to the accountbook unit. The accountbook unit will retain both copies for one year.—Customer Services Dept., 4-1-82.




Retirement Application Processing

As part of the Postal Service's continuing effort to improve the correctness, completeness, and timeliness of retirement application submissions to the Office of Personnel Management (OPM), employees contemplating retirement are encouraged to file their retirement applications as soon as possible—at least six weeks, and not less than two weeks prior to the effective date of the retirement. Early filing of the retirement application is in the best interest of the retiring employee.

- 1. It allows time to receive retirement counseling before the separation date, if desired.
- 2. It gives the employing installation adequate time to accurately prepare the required OPM Form 1084, Information in Support of Civil Service Retirement Application.
- It gives the retiring employee time to review the completed OPM Form 1084 and his personnel records to assure that all periods of creditable civilian and military service have been verified.
- 4. It gives the employing installation adequate time to accurately prepare necessary health benefits and life insurance separation documents and resolve any problems associated with insurance coverage.
- 5. It allows the employing installation time to submit all retirement documents to the Postal Data Center for advance review prior to the separation date.

The Postal Service's goal is to process accurate and complete retirement records to OPM as quickly as possible. This will assist OPM in expediting the claim and issuing retirement benefits to the employee on a timely basis. Retiring employees can greatly assist in this effort and reduce the inconvenience and personal hardship that may result from delayed annuity payments by filing retirement applications early.



MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE USPS AND NRLCA

Counting and Posting of Auxiliary Routes

This memorandum will confirm our mutual understanding that it is not the intent of either party that eligible auxiliary rural routes evaluating over 35 hours not be converted to regular route status.

Therefore, it is agreed:

- 1. When an auxiliary rural route evaluates 35 hours or more, a special count shall be conducted on that route within 90 days excluding July, August and December in accordance with Article 30, Section 1. C.12., of the USPS-NRLCA 1981 National Agreement.
- 2. When the results of the special count indicate that the official evaluation of the route reaches 35 hours, that route will normally be converted to a regular route and filled in accordance with Article 12, Section 3, of the USPS-NRLCA 1981 National Agreement.

The position outlined above represents the understanding of the parties on the subject involved. In witness whereof the parties hereto affix their signatures below this 1st day of March 1982.

Horatio Alger Commemorative Stamp


A 20-cent commemorative stamp honoring American author Horatio Alger on the 150th anniversary of his birth will be issued on April 30 in Willow Grove, Pennsylvania. The first day of issue ceremony will be held at the George Washington Motor Lodge Convention Center during the annual convention of the Horatio Alger Society.

Robert Hallock designed the stamp based on the book cover from the Ragged Dick series of six books, which first brought Alger national prominence in 1867 and 1868. Mr. Hallock adapted the illustration from an early Alger edition found in the historical collection at the Pequot Library in Southport, Connecticut.

Procedures for ordering first day cancellations are as follows: Customers are urged to buy stamps and affix them to their own covers. All covers must be addressed on the right side at least 5/8 of an inch up from the bottom. Insert a filler in each envelope and mail them to: "Customer Affixed Envelopes, Postmaster, Willow Grove, PA 19090-9991" by May 30. There is no charge.

The Postal Service will affix stamps when requested to do so. Mail orders by May 30 to: "Alger Stamp, Postmaster, Willow Grove, PA 19090-9992." The cost is 20 cents per stamp to be affixed and personal checks in the exact amount will be accepted for orders up to the limit of 50 covers. Do not send cash. Postage stamps are unacceptable as payment.




