ORDERS OF THE POSTMASTER GENERAL.

Separate Registered Package Envelopes to be Used to Cover First-Class Registered Mail.

ORDER NO. 2698.

Until otherwise ordered, postmasters will discontinue inclosing registered matter of the 2d, 3d or 4th class in the same registered package envelope with matter of the first class.

All registered package envelopes covering mail of the 2d, 3d or 4th class must be indorsed "Parcel matter" on the outside.

Those portions of the Postal Laws and Regulations which are inconsistent with this Order are hereby modified accordingly.

Suspension of Use of Registry Pouch Bill Coupons with Not-Regular Dispatches of Registered Mail.

ORDER NO. 2699.

The authority given by the Postmaster General in Order No. 2699, dated June 26, 1909, for the suspension of the use of pouch bill coupons with regular dispatches of registered mail is hereby extended to cover all not-regular dispatches of registered mail in through pouches and inner sacks, R. P. O. through pouches and inner sacks, paper and sack jackets.

The use of coupons with dispatches of registered mail in iron-locked pouches where the manifold dispatch book, Form 3853, has been specially authorized is not hereby affected but is to be continued as heretofore.

The instructions accompanying the authority for the suspension of pouch bill coupons with regular dispatches given in the Postmaster General's Order No. 2399, June 28, 1909, printed on pages 9 and 10 of the August, 1909, Postal Guide, apply also to this authority for the suspension of such coupons with not-regular dispatches of registered mail.

Further detailed instructions which may be found necessary under this Order will be issued from the Office of the Third Assistant Postmaster General, upon request therefor.

Every postmaster concerned is enjoined to keep careful watch of the results of this suspension of coupons for not-regular dispatches, which is experimental, and report to the Third Assistant Postmaster General any reason against its continuance.

Ordinary Pouches Closed With Rotary Locks May be Used in the Dispatch of Registered Mail.

Discontinuance of Backstamping Registered Package and Tag Envelopes and Jackets in Transit.

ORDER NO. 2707.

Section 843 of the Postal Laws and Regulations is hereby further amended as follows:

SEC. 843. When a postmaster or a railway postal clerk receives a registered package or jacket, he must carefully examine it, and, if in bad condition, must note thereon, and on the records, a statement of the facts over his signature or office stamp. No "Record of Transit" need be made on registered package, tag envelopes or jackets except at the office of delivery and when received in bad condition or missent. The absence of indorsement will be deemed a certification that the article was in good condition.

2. If registered tag envelopes are torn off in transit they must be securely re-attached to the parcels from which they became separated. (See Section 819).

closed with rotary locks whenever the supply of registry pouches and sacks on hand is insufficient.

Postmasters and railway postal clerks receiving registered mail in ordinary pouches closed with rotary locks need not return the ordinary pouches, which, if not needed for use, should be treated as surplus mail bags, in accordance with Section 1352 of the Postal Laws and Regulations.

Rotary locks used in closing dispatches of registered mail in ordinary pouches will be disposed of in accordance with the Postal Laws and Regulations, and the special instructions issued by the Third Assistant Postmaster General:

(1) authorizing not-regular dispatches of inner registered sacks by postmasters and by railway postal clerks.

(2) for the conduct of the R. P. O. through pouch and inner sack service.

Such portions of the Postal Laws and Regulations as are inconsistent with this Order are hereby modified accordingly.

Bulk Billing of Registered Mail of the 2d, 3d and 4th Classes.

ORDER NO. 2701.

Beginning November 22, 1909, and continuing until otherwise ordered, postmasters and railway postal clerks making dispatches of registered mail in through pouches, inner sacks and lead-sealed jackets, are hereby authorized to bill matter of the 2d, 3d and 4th classes in bulk in lieu of descriptive entries on the bills, as heretofore.

All matter of the 1st class will continue to be billed as at present. R. P. E.'s containing matter of the 2d, 3d and 4th classes must be indorsed "parcel matter" to indicate the class of matter inclosed, and will be billed in bulk with other matter of those classes.

For example: If there are twenty pieces (5 first-class and 15 second, third and fourth class) to be dispatched in a through pouch, inner sack or lead-sealed jacket, the 5 first-class pieces will be described on the bill by R. P. E. number, office of origin, date of post-

mark and destination, and the 15 pieces of the 2d, 3d and 4th classes will be billed as one entry, thus: "15 parcels," without other specific description.

Matter received in bulk must be counted and verified by the entry on the bill.

Postmasters and railway postal clerks will continue to make a descriptive record of all classes of registered mail when re-dispatching same under cover of iron-locked pouches.

Postmasters receiving 2d, 3d and 4th class matter billed in bulk, for delivery at their offices, will record and deliver it in the usual manner. Registered special delivery matter of whatever class must be given a descriptive entry, and handled in the same manner as first-class matter.

Those portions of the Postal Laws and Regulations which are inconsistent with this Order are hereby modified accordingly.

Not-Regular Inner Registered Sacks May Be Dispatched to All Post Offices of the First and Second Classes On and After Dec. 1, 1909.

To the Postmasters Concerned:

Arrangements have been made with the Second Assistant Postmaster General to have the postmasters at all post offices of the first and second classes furnished with ordinary rotary-lock keys by Dec. 1, 1909.

Postmasters dispatching registered mail in through pouches or inner sacks are therefore authorized, on and after Dec. 1, 1909, to make not-regular dispatches of inner registered sacks to any office of the first or second class, in addition to any other office known to have an ordinary rotary-lock key, in accordance with instructions printed on pages 71 to 73 of the July, 1909, Postal Guide.

The names of the post offices of the first and second classes may be obtained from the list of offices of the first, second and third classes printed on pages 660 to 688 of the July, 1909, Postal Guide, and a list of other offices having rotary-lock keys will be found on pages 106 and 107 of the same Guide. Additions are published in the monthly supplements.

Lead-sealed sack jackets must not be made up when it is possible to dispatch the registered mail in inner registered sacks. If no inner sacks are on hand, registered mail should be dispatched in an ordinary pouch closed with a rotary lock in preference to a lead-sealed sack jacket.

Postmasters receiving not-regular dispatches of registered mail under cover of rotary locks are enjoined to read and comply with the instructions governing not-regular dispatches of registered mail, so far as applicable to their offices.

Not-Regular R. P. O. Inner Registered Sacks.

To Those Concerned:

All post offices, railway post offices and terminal railway post offices authorized to dispatch R. P. O. through registered pouches or inner sacks are hereby authorized to make not-regular dispatches of R. P. O. inner registered sacks to any post office, railway post office or terminal railway post office known to be supplied with R. M. S. rotary-lock key, whenever the quantity or bulk of registered matter justifies.

Not-regular dispatches of R. P. O. inner registered sacks (including the disposition of equipment) are to be governed by the Postal Laws and Regulations relative to regular dispatches, the special instructions authorizing not-regular dispatches of inner registered sacks by postmasters printed on pages 71 to 73 of the July, 1909, Postal Guide and the printed instructions for the conduct of R. P. O. through pouch and R. P. O. inner sack service heretofore furnished.

When inner registered sacks are not available, dispatches may be made under cover of ordinary pouches closed with rotary locks.

Lead-sealed sack-jackets should not be used by postmasters or in the Railway Mail Service for the dispatch of registered mail in any case where it may be sent under cover of sacks or pouches closed with rotary locks, and the authorization for the use of lead-sealed sack-jackets in the Railway Mail Service printed on page 74 of the July, 1909, Postal Guide is hereby modified accordingly.

NOTICE.

Candy in the Parcel-Post.

OFFICE OF SECOND ASS'T P. M. GEN'L, WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 23, 1909.

The Department having been advised that postmasters are refusing to receive packages containing candy for dispatch by parcel-post, postal officials are hereby instructed that the prohibition against "confections" in the parcel-post extends only to fruit preserved with sugar.

Consequently, candy not containing fruit, is mailable by parcel-post, provided it is so substantially packed as not liable to damage other articles in the same mail.

Postmasters will cause due notice of the foregoing to be taken at their offices.
