REMOVAL OF DEAD BABY CHICKS

Post office employees, railway postal clerks, and railroad employees may, when practicable, remove dead baby chicks from the boxes on account of their offensive odor as a measure of protection to health.

When dead baby chicks are so removed the following notation shall be made on the box:

"Removed from this box ----- dead chicks.

Date Name and P. O., R. P. O. or train No."

AIR-MAIL SERVICE—LONDON TO IRAN

Mail for northern Iran sent by air from London is now dispatched by air from Baghdad to Kermanshah and Teheran every Friday. However, the British Administration sends air mail for Iran by all flights from London to Baghdad for onward dispatch by the most advantageous means (air or train, depending on day of arrival). The air-mail transit time from London to Kermanshah and Teheran is from 4 to 7 days, representing a gain of about 8 days over ordinary dispatch all the way.

Consequently, effective at once, the air-mail fee to Iran "From London" is increased to 16 cents per half ounce, in addition to the ordinary postage.

AIR-MAIL SERVICE—LONDON TO ASIA AND AUSTRALIA

The air-mail service from London to Asia and Australia has been augmented, there being now five flights per week to India, three to Malaya, Siam, and Australia, and two to Hong Kong. The schedules are as follows:

CHANGES FOR THE FOREIGN AIR-MAIL SERVICE LEAFLET

In consequence of the changes in the air-mail service from London, the new Foreign Air-Mail Service leaflet (edition of July 1, 1938) should be modified as follows (Part 3, pp. 4 to 8):

In the items *Australia*, *Borneo (North)*, *Brunei*, *Burma*, *Federated Malay States*, *Malay States (Nonfederated)*, *Netherlands Indies*, *Sarawak*, *Siam*, and *Straits Settlements*, add "Sat." after "Thur." in the first line of the routing "From London."

In the items *Bahrain*, *Iraq*, *Syria*, and *Transjordan*, change the first line of the routing "From London" to "Lv. London daily except Mon. and Tue."

In the following items make the changes indicated:

Australia ("Trans-Pacific"), change last line to "Ar. Darwin in 15 days, Brisbane and Sydney in 17 days. Includes air-mail service in Australia, reaching most important cities from 1 to 3 days later."

China ("From London" and "From London and in China"), and *Hong Kong*, change "6 to 7 days" to "6 days."

India (British) ("Trans-Pacific") last line, change "13 days" to "14 days." ("From London"), change entire routing to "Lv. London daily except Mon. and Tue. Ar. Karachi in 3 or 3½ days; thence by the ordinary means".

("From London and in India"), change entire routing to "Lv. London daily except Mon. and Tue. Ar. Karachi in 3 or 3½ days, Allahabad and Calcutta in 4 days; includes air-mail service in India, reaching most important cities within 1 or 2 more days."

Iran ("From London"), column 2, change "11 cents" to "16 cents"; column 3, change the entire routing to "Lv. London daily except Mon. and Tue. Ar. Teheran in 4 to 7 days, Bushire in 5 to 10 days."

Netherlands Indies ("Trans-Pacific"), change "16 days" to "14 days."

New Zealand ("Trans-Pacific"), change last line to "Ar. Sydney, Australia, in 17 days; thence by the ordinary means."

("From London"), change the entire routing to "Lv. London Thur., Sat., and Sun. Ar. Sydney, Australia, in 10 days; thence by the ordinary means."

Palestine ("From London"), change the entire routing to "Lv. London daily except Mon. and Tue. Ar. Tiberias or Lydda in 2 days."

NEW ISSUE \$1.00 ORDINARY POSTAGE STAMPS

Postmasters are hereby advised that the \$1.00 stamp bearing the likeness of Woodrow Wilson will be the next denomination to be made available in the new regular series.

The stamp will be of the regular size, arranged vertically. It will be printed in bicolor, with black center and lavender border, by the flat-plate process, and will be issued in sheets of 100.

The new \$1.00 stamp will be first placed on sale at Washington, D. C., on August 29, 1938, and at other post offices as soon thereafter as practicable.

Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the new stamp on August 29 may send a limited number of addressed covers, *not in excess of 10*, to the Postmaster at Washington, D. C., with a cash or postal money order remittance to cover only the cost of the stamps required for affixing. *Postage stamps will positively not be accepted in payment.* Each cover should bear a pencil endorsement in the upper right corner to show the number of stamps to be attached thereto. Envelopes for covers should not be smaller than 3 by 6 inches. Compliance cannot be made with unusual requests, such as for the affixing of plate number blocks, etc., and all covers must be fully addressed.

Requests for uncanceled stamps must not be included with orders for first-day covers to the postmaster at the above office.

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the new \$1.00 stamp will be placed on sale at the Philatelic Agency, Washington, D. C., on August 29, 1938. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the Agency must be limited to the \$1.00 stamp excluding other varieties of stamps heretofore on sale.

Postmasters at direct and central-accounting post offices may submit a separate requisition for a limited supply of the new issue \$1.00 stamps. So far as production will permit, all regular requisitions for \$1.00 stamps after August 29 will be filled in whole or in part with stamps of the new issue.

Postmasters at district-accounting post offices may obtain needed stocks of new design \$1.00 stamps by requisitions on the central-accounting postmaster after August 29.

In some cases shipments of the new \$1.00 stamp may be received by postmasters prior to the close of business on August 29. In all such cases care must be exercised not to allow any of the stamps to be sold before August 30.
