#### **REGISTERED ARTICLES—NUMBERING AND POSTMARKING—RETURN RECEIPTS**

The Department is still receiving reports of the illegible numbering and improper postmarking of registered articles addressed to foreign countries, failure to supply return receipts (Form 2865) when requested and paid for, insufficient prepayment of return receipts, and use of improper forms for return receipts, as well as irregularities and omissions on the part of this service in connection with return receipts originating in foreign countries, particularly with respect to the absence of the postmark of the delivering office and the date of delivery.

In view of the large volume of mail to be handled during the approaching Christmas season, postmasters are especially requested to see that all registration numbers, whether written or stamped with numbering machines are clear and unmistakable, the use of stamped or typed numbers on large mailings of registered articles being encouraged. Postmasters are likewise requested to see that registered articles addressed to foreign countries for which the sender requests a return receipt bear, on the front, the conspicuous notation, "Avis de Reception" (return receipt) or the imprint of a stamp In such cases, Form 2865 shall be made up and fastened securely "A. R." to the outside of the article by all first-, second-, and third-class offices, the return receipt being supplied by the dispatching exchange office in the case of registered articles originating at fourth-class offices. A fee of 5 cents shall be charged for a return receipt requested at the time of mailing and 10 cents if requested after mailing. Also, particular care should be exercised to see that return receipts from foreign countries are duly signed by the addressee and completed by the delivering postmaster so as to show the postmark of his office and the date of delivery.

In this connection, attention is invited to paragraph 2, section 2208 of the Postal Laws and Regulations, and paragraph 8, section 106, page 55, part II of the current Official Postal Guide.

# MODIFICATION OF RESTRICTIONS OF JAPANESE BEETLE QUARANTINE NO. 48, U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Referring to quarantine order No. 48 on account of the Japanese beetle, notice is given to postmasters in the regulated area in the States of Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia, and the District of Columbia, that effective November 1, 1938, the following articles, the interstate movement of which is not considered to constitute a risk of Japanese beetle dissemination, are exempted from the restrictions of the regulations of this quarantine:

Balsam pillows, when composed of balsam needles only.

Banana stalks, when crushed, dried and shredded.

3. Dyed moss and dyed sand, when heat treated, and when so labeled on

the outside of each container of such materials. 4. Floral designs or "set pieces," including wreaths, sprays, casket covers, and all formal florists' designs. Bouquets and cut flowers not so prepared are not exempted.

5. Herbarium specimens, when dried, pressed, and treated, and when so labeled on the outside of each container of such materials.

6. Manure, peat, compost, or humus (a) when dehydrated and either shredded, ground, pulverized, or compressed, or (b) when treated with crude petroleum or any other product having high potency as an insecticide, and when so labeled on the outside of each commercial container of such materials. (See also item 13.)

Moss, sheet (Calliergon schriberi and Thuridium recognitum).

Mushroom spawn, in brick, flake, or pure culture form. 8.

Orchids, cut. 9.

10. Orchid plants, when growing exclusively in Osmunda fiber.

11. Osmunda fiber, Osmundine, or orchid peat (Osmunda cinnamomea and O. claytoniana).

12. Resurrection plant or birdsnest moss (Selaginella lepidophylla).

13. Sphagnum moss, bog-moss, or peat moss (Sphagnaceae) when dried (See also item 6.) and baled.

14. Trailing arbutus, or Mayflower (Epigaea repens), when free from soil or primary roots, and when shipped during the period between October 16 and June 14, inclusive.

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the new \$5 stamp will be placed on sale at the Philatelic Agency, Washington, D. C., on November 17, 1938. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the agency must be limited to the \$5 stamp, excluding other varieties of stamps heretofore on sale.

Postmasters at direct and central-accounting post offices may submit requisitions for a limited supply of the \$5 stamp to conform to local mailing quirements, but such requisitions must exclude other denominations.

So far as required to meet specific requests from local patrons, postmasters at district-accounting offices may obtain needed supplies of the new \$5 stamp by requisition on the central-accounting postmaster after November 17. In some cases shipments of the new \$5 stamp may be received by postmasters prior to the close of business on November 17. In all such cases care must be exercised not to allow any of the stamps to be sold before November 18.

#### **NEW ISSUE \$5 ORDINARY POSTAGE STAMPS**

Postmasters are hereby advised that the \$5 stamp bearing the likeness of Calvin Coolidge will be the next denomination to be made available in the new regular series.

The stamp will be of the regular size, arranged vertically. It will be printed in bicolor, with black center and red border, by the flat-plate process, and will be issued in sheets of 100.

The new \$5 stamp will be first placed on sale at Washington, D. C., on November 17, 1938.

Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancelations of the new stamp on November 17 may send a limited number of addressed covers, not in excess of 10, to the postmaster at Washington, D. C., with a cash or postal money order remittance to cover only the cost of the stamps required for affixing. Postage stamps will positively not be accepted in payment. Each cover should bear a pencil endorsement in the upper right corner to show the number of stamps to be attached thereto. Envelopes for covers should not be smaller than 3 by 6 inches. Compliance cannot be made with unusual requests, such as for the affixing of plate number blocks, etc., and all covers must be fully addressed.

Requests for uncanceled stamps must not be included with orders for first-day covers to the postmaster at the above office.
