ORDER OF THE POSTMASTER GENERAL

PROMPT DISPOSITION OF SURPLUS MAIL BAGS AND MAIL-BAG LOCKS

Order No. 22204.

Dated August 26, 1943

An inventory of domestic mail bags (both empty and those containing mail) and locks used for closing sacks and pouches will be taken in the entire Postal Service as of noon, September 13,

All post offices, Terminal RPO's, Transfer Offices, and others accumulating surplus mail bags and locks (other than mail bag depositories and first- and second-class post offices specially designated by the General Superintendent, Railway Mail Service. to store surplus No. 1 sacks) shall commence immediately and continue to promptly dispatch each day all surplus mail bags and locks accumulating in their offices to the designated mail bag depository or other receiving points to which they ship.

These shipments shall continue as long as delivery can be effected at such points before midnight on September 12, 1943. Dispatch of empty bags and locks that would not be due to reach destination before midnight on September 12, 1943, shall be withheld for dispatch until after 12 o'clock noon, on September 13, 1943. This shall not be construed to affect disposal of locks and equipment by RPO trains arriving at terminals between midnight September 12 and 12 o'clock noon, September 13.

Division Superintendents, Chief Clerks, and other supervisory officials in the Railway Mail Service are instructed to see that this order is obeyed insofar as their service is concerned and postmasters are instructed that this matter must be given their personal attention to insure compliance.

Detailed instructions will be furnished to all postmasters and Division Superintendents of the Railway Mail Service with reference to the inventory to be taken as of noon, September 13, 1943.

INSTRUCTIONS OF THIRD ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL

COMMEMORATIVE STAMPS—OVERRUN COUNTRIES **FRANCE**

Postmasters and employees of the Postal Service are advised that a 5-cent postage stamp honoring France, the seventh stamp in the Overrun Countries Series, will be first placed on sale September 28, 1943, at Washington, D. C. Announcements concerning the remaining stamps in the series will appear

The central design of the France stamp is a reproduction of the flag of that country in natural colors—blue, white and red—with the name "France" printed underneath in blue. The stamp will be of the specialdelivery size, 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimensions, arranged horizontally and issued fifty stamps to a sheet.

Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancelations of the stamp for France on September 28, 1943, may send a limited number of addressed envelopes, not in excess of 10, to the Postmaster, Washington 13, D. C., with cash or money-order remittance to cover cost of the stamps required for affixing. Postage stamps and personal checks will not be accepted in payment for stamps, and requests for uncanceled stamps must not be included with orders for first-day covers. Envelopes used for covers should be of ordinary letter size, and each envelope properly addressed. An enclosure of medium weight should be inserted in each cover and the flap sealed or turned in. Each envelope should be pencil-marked in the upper right corner to show the number of stamps to be affixed and the name of the country. Covers for other stamps of the Overrun Countries Series should not be included with the order for France first-day covers.

Stamps of this series desired for postage purposes should be purchased at the local post office. Stamps of selected quality for collection may be obtained on mail order sent to the Philatelic Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C. Stamps are sold through this Agency at face

value, plus return mailing charges. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the Philatelic Agency for the France stamp should not include other stamp issues. The Philatelic Agency does not service first-day covers.

Postmasters at direct and central-accounting offices may submit separate requisitions, on Form 3201-A, to reach the Department not later than September 21, 1943, for a limited supply of the 5-cent France stamp, endorsed "France", shipment of which will be made as soon as the printed stock is available. Postmasters at district-accounting offices may obtain small quantities of this stamp by requisition on the central-accounting post office. Postmasters are cautioned not to place this stamp on sale before September 29, 1943.

Requisitions shall not be submitted for any of the remaining stamps in the Overrun Countries Series until further notification is received.

CASHING OF MONEY ORDERS BY MEMBERS OF THE WACS, WAVES, SPARS, AND WOMEN RESERVES OF THE MARINE CORPS

Reference is made to the notice which appeared in the POSTAL BULLETIN of March 25, 1942, under the heading "Cashing of Money Orders Presented by Soldiers, Sailors, and Marines." It is stated therein that the collection of a fee for payment of a money order not more than 60 days old and presented by a soldier, sailor, or marine is suspended.

Since members of the WACS are now considered to be enlisted personnel of the United States Army and WAVES, SPARS and Women Reserves of the Marine Corps, personnel of the Navy, the collection of fees for the payment of money orders not more than 60 days old drawn in favor of, and presented by, a member of either of the women's organizations mentioned is suspended and the same privileges are extended to them as are available to the men of the armed forces.
