INSTRUCTIONS OF FIRST AND FOURTH ASSISTANT POSTMASTERS GENERAL

DEPARTMENT OF STATE POSTER RELATING TO LEVA BANK DEPOSITS IN BULGARIA HELD BY AMERICAN CITIZENS LOBBY DISPLAY AUTHORIZED

Postmasters are authorized to display for a reasonable period in available space in post office lobbies a poster to be distributed by the Department of State, relating to leva bank deposits in Bulgaria held by American citizens. The poster should be displayed in such a manner as not to mar the walls or woodwork.

INSTRUCTIONS OF SECOND ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL

SPECIAL-DELIVERY ARTICLES FROM FOREIGN COUNTRIES

Information has been received indicating that the Italian Postal Administration is permitting the use of special-delivery stamps for postage on articles not intended for special-delivery service.

Postmasters shall exercise care to see that articles from foreign countries are not given special delivery unless they are marked or labeled "Express".

INSTRUCTIONS OF THIRD ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL

ACCOUNTING FOR SECOND-CLASS POSTAGE

When accounting for postage on second-class matter postmasters shall include in receipt Form 3539 and in the quarterly newspaper and periodical statement Form 3551 only mailings which are subject to postage at the pound rates or which are entitled to free county circulation. Postage at the per copy rates provided by section 34.41, Postal Laws and Regulations, 1948 Edition, paragraphs (b), (i), and (j), and the transient second-class rate provided by section 34.42, Postal Laws and Regulations, 1948 Edition, must be paid by means of stamps affixed to the copies unless the copies are mailed under the provisions of section 35.4, Postal Laws and Regulations, 1948 Edition, and this postage must not be entered in Forms 3539 and 3551.

MULTIPLE FORMS USED IN PREPARING C. O. D. ARTICLES FOR MAILING

It has been brought to attention that some multiple forms used in connection with c. o. d. mailings do not meet the requirements of the Department in one or more of the following respects:

1. The printed matter on the address label portions does not conform generally to the prescribed arrangement and text of approved address labels.

2. The printed matter on the c. o. d. tag label portions does not conform generally to the arrangement and text of the printed matter on the counterparts of the c. o. d. tags over which the labels are affixed, or the labels are not adapted to the particular style of c. o. d. tag used in conjunction with the forms.

3. Specially printed c. o. d. tags incorporated in the sets of multiple forms do not conform in all required respects to the dimensions, or in the arrangement and text of the printed matter, or in the quality of the paper stock, of the latest stock c. o. d. tags which they replaced. (Specially printed c. o. d. tags used in lieu of stock c. o. d. tag, Form 3816a-S, must embody a margin of not less than seven-eighths inch at each end over which to affix adhesive tape.) It is essential to the proper handling of c. o. d. parcels prepared by means of multiple forms that each portion thereof which is to be used for postal purposes shall conform generally to the requirements of chapter XIII, article 61, Manual of Instructions for Postal Personnel, and instructions published in the POSTAL BULLETINS of November 13, 1947, and November 4, 1948, captioned "Multiple forms used in preparing c. o. d. articles for mailing.' Where doubt exists as to whether multiple forms are correctly arranged in every respect, two complete sets of such forms should be obtained and submitted to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Registered, Insured, and C. O. D. Mails. If known, the names and addresses of the printers of the multiple forms should also be shown in the letters of transmittal.

CHANGES IN SECTION NUMBERS IN POSTAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS OF 1948

Section numbers in the Postal Laws and Regulations of 1948 differ from those in the 1940 edition. Therefore, patrons should be informed that mailings hereafter prepared upon which it is required that a reference to the Postal Laws and Regulations shall appear must show the new section numbers listed below:

Mailers may continue for the time being to use supplies of envelopes, cards, wrappers, etc., bearing the old section numbers which they have on hand.

Until further notice postmasters may accept mail bearing postage meter impressions showing the old section numbers.

3-CENT GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC COMMEMORATIVE STAMP

The Department will issue a 3-cent stamp through the Indianapolis, Ind., post office, on August 29, 1949, to commemorate the Final National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The stamp will be 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimensions, arranged horizontally, printed by the rotary process in red, electric-eye perforated, and issued in sheets of 50 subjects. The printing of 110,000,000 G. A. R. stamps has been authorized.

The central design depicts a G. A. R. veteran as he is today; old, wrinkled, head bowed, near the end of his road. Behind him, he is shown in his youth, as a Union soldier; bathed in light, looking upward, confident and strong, at the beginning of his long road. Across the top of the stamp is the wording "Final National Encampment Of The" in white-face Gothic. In the upper left corner of the design is an hour glass representing time, most of which has run out, as indicated by the sand in the lower half. Across the face of the hour glass are the letters "G A R" in dark Gothic. Centered below the glass is the denomination "3e" in dark modified Roman with the word "Cents" in dark Gothic underneath. In a panel at the bottom appears the wording "United States Postage" in white-face Gothic on a dark background.

Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancellations of this stamp may send a limited number of addressed envelopes, not in excess of 10, to the Postmaster, Indianapolis, Ind., with postal note or money order remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed. **Postage stamps and personal checks will not be accepted in payment.** Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed. An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either sealed or turned in. An outside envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. The envelope to the Postmaster, Indianapolis, Ind., should be endorsed "First Day Covers." Collectors should refrain from requesting hand cancellations since covers will be machine canceled so far as practicable. Orders for first-day covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps.

For the enefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the 3-cent G. A. R. commemorative stamp will be available at the Philatelic Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., on and after August 30, 1949. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the Agency should include no other stamp issues. The Philatelic Agency does

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not service first-day covers.

Postmasters at direct and central-accounting post offices will receive an initial supply of the G. A. R. stamps on orders prepared in the Department. Therefore, postmasters at these offices will not submit requisitions for the same. Direct and central-accounting postmasters are furnished commemorative stamps as fast as they can be manufactured. They are, therefore, requested to refrain from reporting the nonreceipt of shipments until a reasonable time has elapsed after the first day of issue.

Postmasters at district-accounting post offices may obtain needed quantities of the 3-cent G. A. R. commemorative stamps by requisition on the central-accounting postmaster.

Postmasters will please post a copy of this notice on the bulletin board, give information to the press, and notify all local stamp clubs regarding the issuance of the 3-cent Grand Army of the Republic commemorative stamp. Postmasters are cautioned not to place the stamp herein announced on sale before August 30, 1949.

CHIEF CLERK AND DIRECTOR OF PERSONNEL

POSTAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS OF 1948

The distribution of the 1948 edition of the Postal Laws and Regulations has been completed. If any postmaster has not received a copy he should communicate with the Chief Clerk and Director of Personnel of the Department.

Amendments to the 1948 edition will be printed in the POSTAL BULLETIN and reprinted in the Quarterly Supplement to the Official Postal Guide. Amendments printed at the back of the Supplements should be carefully preserved. They are printed on one side of the page so that they may be clipped and pasted directly opposite the section amended, or they may be pasted in a separate book, the margin of each section amended being marked with the number of the insert affecting that particular section. The Department does not furnish blank books for this purpose.

The concordance found on page 907 shows the disposition of sections of the 1940 edition.

Copies of the Postal Laws and Regulations furnished by the Department for official use must be carefully preserved (see sec. 25.8, Postal Laws and Regulations, 1948). The Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C., supplies copies of this publication to the public at \$2.75 a copy. Remittance is required in advance and must be made by money order or check payable and addressed to that official.

AMENDMENTS TO THE POSTAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS OF 1948

ORDER No. 41062; DATED July 22, 1949.

The Postal Laws and Regulations of 1948 are hereby amended as indicated in the following inserts Nos. 1 to 18, inclusive.

SUMMER AND WINTER RESORT POST OFFICES

INSERT NO. 1.

ORDER NO. 41062; DATED JULY 22, 1949.

In section 24.6, Summer and winter resort post offices, amend paragraph (c) to read as follows:

(c) Advance report of closing.—Thirty days prior to the close of each season the postmaster at a winter-resort or summer-resort post office shall notify the First Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Postmasters, of the date on which the office is to be closed for the season, so that necessary changes in mail service may be made. The First Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Postmasters, and the central accounting postmaster shall be notified of the postmaster's own post office address during the period the office is to be closed.

PERFORMANCE OF DUTIES DURING ABSENCE OF POSTMASTER

INSERT NO. 2.

ORDER NO. 41062; DATED JULY 22, 1949.

In section 24.9, Performance of duties during absence of postmaster make the following changes:

1. Amend paragraph (b) to read as follows:

(b) Who shall be designated.—The assistant postmaster shall in all cases manage the business of the post office during the absence of the postmaster, unless some other clerk is designated for this purpose, as provided in paragraph (a).

NOTE.—See sections 137.8 and 137.81 as to assistant postmasters and their duties.

2. Rescind paragraph (c).

3. Redesignate paragraphs (d) and (e) as paragraphs (c) and (d), respectively.

FEES FOR ENTRY AS SECOND-CLASS MATTER

INSERT NO. 3.

ORDER NO. 41062; DATED JULY 22, 1949.

In section 34.28, Fees for entry as second-class matter, rescind paragraph (d), and redesignate paragraph (e) as paragraph (d).

FOURTH-CLASS RATES TO ALASKA, HAWAIIAN ISLANDS, AND CANAL ZONE INSERT No. 4.

ORDER NO. 41062; DATED JULY 22, 1949.

Amend section 34.80, Fourth-class rates to Alaska, Hawaiian Islands, and Canal Zone, to read as follows:

Sec. 34.80. Fourth-class rates to Alaska, Hawaiian Islands, and Canal Zone.—The eighth-zone rates of postage shall apply to fourth-class mai transported: (1) Between the United States proper and the Hawaiian Islands or Alaska; (2) between Hawaii and Alaska; (3) between the United States and the Canal Zone; (4) to, from or between Tutuila, Manua, and the other islands of the Samoan Group east of longitude 171° west of Greenwich and the United States and its other possessions.

2. Add a new section, Section 35.16a, Radioactive material, in text be tween sections 35.16 and 35.17 to read as follows:

Sec. 35.16a. Radioactive material—(a) When mailable.—Radioactive materials (liquid, solid, or gaseous; manufactured articles such as instrument or clock dials of which radioactive materials are a component part; luminous compounds; ores and residues) which fulfill all the following conditions shall be accepted for mailing provided they are properly packed in a strong tight outside container and marked "Radioactive Material—Gamma Radiation at Surface of Parcel Less than 10 Milliroentgens for 24 hours—No Significant Alpha, Beta, or Neutron Radiation."

(b) Lakage.—The package must be such that there can be no leakage of radic 'aftive material under conditions normally incident to transportation in t^{Af} mails in sacks.

($\frac{5}{10}$ Maximum contents.—The package must contain not more than 0.1 m⁻¹₁ icuries of radium, or polonium, or that amount of strontium 89, strontium 90, or barium 140 which disintegrates at a rate of more than 5 million atoms per second; or that amount of any other radioactive substance which disintegrates at a rate of more than 50 million atoms per second.

(d) Amount of radiation at surface.—The package must be such that no significant alpha, beta, or neutron radiation is emitted from the exterior of the package and the gamma radiation at any surface of the package must be less than 10 milliroentgens for 24 hours.

(e) Specifications of container.—The design and preparation of the package of radioactive material must be such that there will be no significant radioactive surface contamination of any part of the container. Liquids must be packed in tight glass, earthenware, or other suitable inside containers surrounded by an absorbent material sufficient to absorb the entire liquid contents and of such nature that its efficiency will not be impaired by chemical reaction with the contents.

NOTE.—The amounts of radioactive materials shown are based on exemptions to I. C. C. regulation 367, while packaging requirements are based on I. C. C. regulation 368.

SPECIAL PACKING OF CERTAIN MATTER

INSERT NO. 7.

Order No. 41062; Dated July 22, 1949.

In section 35.18, Special packing of certain matter, make the following changes:

1. Amend subparagraphs (5) and (6) of paragraph (d) to read as follows: "(5) In metal containers.—(i) Mailable liquids in securely closed (hermetically sealed; screw top with gasket or inner seal, or approved patented top) good quality metal containers, when in quantities of less than 1 gallon and individually cushioned in a strong, tightly closed outside container of metal, wood, or fiberboard, shall be accepted for mailing, but when in friction or compression top cans with capacity over 4.27 fluid ounces the tops shall be securely soldered on in not less than four places equally spaced. Such parcels shall be marked "Fragile—Liquid—Less than 1 gallon in metal containers" and shall be dispatched inside of mail bags.

"(ii) Mailable liquids in securely closed good quality metal containers (friction or compression type top or covers, except heavy milk cans, to be securely soldered on in not less than six places equally spaced when can is of 1 gallon capacity) in quantities of 1 gallon or more shall be accepted for mailing when closed and packed in accordance with preceding paragraph as amended but in proportionately stronger outside container provided when gross weight exceeds 30 pounds, the closure if of tape shall be reinforced, but when in extra strong metal containers with handle or bail the boxing may be omitted. Such boxed parcels shall be marked 'Fragile—Liquid—Outside Mail—1 gallon or more in metal container' and shall be dispatched outside of mail bags.

2. Redesignate subparagraph (7) as subparagraph (6)."

EMPLOYEES FORBIDDEN TO PLACE MAIL IN CLOTHING, HAND GRIPS, PARCELS, OR OTHER LUGGAGE

INSERT NO. 8.

MAILING OF MATTER WITHOUT STAMPS AFFIXED

INSERT NO. 5. ORDER NO. 41062; DATED JULY 22, 1949.

In section 35.4, Mailing of matter without stamps affixed, rescind subparagraph (5) of paragraph (e).

RADIOACTIVE MATERIAL

INSERT NO. 6.

ORDER NO. 41062; DATED JULY 22, 1949.

In part 35 make the following changes:

1. Add a new section to read section 35.16a, Radioactive material, between sections 35.16 and 35.17 in the list of sections.

ORDER NO. 41062; DATED July 22, 1949.

Amend section 41.3, Employees forbidden to place mail in clothing, to read as follows:

SEC. 41.3. Employees forbidden to place mail in clothing, hand grips, parcels, or other luggage.—Employees of the postal service shall not place or carry in their pockets or in other parts of their clothing, or in hand grips, parcels, or other luggage, any mail which is in the custody of the postal service.

NOTE.—See section 130.47 as to penalty for improperly detaining, opening, or destroying letters; section 130.49 as to penalty for intercepting or secreting letters.

FACING SLIPS

INSERT NO. 9.

ORDER NO. 41062; DATED JULY 22, 1949.

In section 42.34, Facing slips, make the following changes: 1. Delete "section 107.16" and insert, in lieu thereof, "section 108.16."

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2. Amend note to read as follows:

"Note.—The foregoing does not apply where direct sacks are made up by a mailer who provides labels printed to show his name and the point of mailing. See section 43.1 as to filing and disposing of facing slips received."

OFFICE REGULATIONS CONCERNING CARRIERS

INSERT No. 10.

ORDER No. 41062; DATED JULY 22, 1949.

In section 50.6, Office regulations concerning carriers, amend paragraph (j) to read as follows:

"(j) Carrier's record of changes of address.—A city delivery carrier shall not be required to keep a complete directory of all patrons on his route but shall keep a record of all changes of address. In cases involving local changes of address, Form 22, "Order to Change Address," after being recorded in the route directory of the carrier who served the patron at the old address shall be turned over to the carrier regularly assigned to serve the route to which the patron is moving for information and initialing. Unlimited forwarding orders and permanent changes of address shall be observed for a period of 2 years."

In section 53.7, Make-up and dispatch of special-delivery matter, add a note to read as follows:

"Note.—Each sack dispatched containing special delivery matter shall have a Form 3952 attached, or the label clearly marked 'Special Delivery'."

ORDER NO. 41062: DATED JULY 22, 1949.

In section 60.14, Forwarding registered matter, amend paragraph (e) to read as follows:

"(e) Procedure when forwarding or returning.—In forwarding or returning registered mail, the postmaster shall not change the name of the addressee or sender, but shall change the address only, cross off the name of his post office and State, plainly mark the article 'Forward' or 'Returned to writer' ('R. W.'), as may be proper, postmark it to show the date of such action and dispatch the article under its original registration number. If forwarded, the original return receipt, if any, shall accompany the article. If returned to writer, the original return receipt, if any, shall be destroyed. The delivery book or other authorized record shall show when and to what office and State a given article was forwarded, or when and to what office and State or country the article was returned, and the number under which it was dispatched."

The finding of the Postmaster General under section 36.9, that the scheme or enterprise is carried on by means of false or fraudulent representations shall relieve the Post Office Department of liability for indemnity as to matter mailed after notice of the institution of proceedings pursuant to section 36.9 has been given to the person conducting the scheme or enterprise. As to matter mailed before such notice, the findings of the Postmaster General will be regarded as evidence that the scheme or enterprise is fraudulent."

In section 137.31, Gross postal receipts as basis for compensation and allowances, amend paragraph (b) to read as follows:

(b) Of what comprised.—Gross postal receipts of a post office on which the annual salary of the postmaster is based shall consist of the amount of postage stamps (including stamps in books and coils, air-mail and specialdelivery stamps, special-handling stamps, postage-due stamps, stamped envelopes, special request envelopes, air letter sheets), and postal cards sold for use at the office; excess received from the sale of stamped envelopes, singly and in odd lots, over the Department invoice value; application fees for entry and reentry of publications as second-class matter; amounts of postage at pound rates collected in money on second-class matter mailed by publishers and news agents; amounts of postage collected in money on first-, third-, and fourth-class matter and second-class matter not included in the preceding item mailed without postage stamps affixed under sections 34.66 and 35.4; application fees for permit to mail matter of any class without stamps affixed as nonmetered mail; fees covering mailing of third-class matter in bulk; box rents for the calendar year; and miscellaneous receipts such as those resulting from sales of waste papers, twine, or dead parcel post, newspapers, magazines and printed matter.

Amend section 64.30, Receipting on tags, to read as follows:

Sec. 64.30. Receipting on c. o. d. tags.—In delivering c. o. d. mail, receipts shall be obtained on the tags attached thereto. Receipts on c. o. d. tags shall be obtained from senders for all c. o. d. mail returned to them as undelivered matter.
