INSTRUCTIONS OF ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL **BUREAU OF TRANSPORTATION**

REGULAR MAIL AND PARCEL POST SERVICE AVAILABLE TO THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA

It has come to the attention of the Department that some post offices are not aware that regular mail and parcel post service, both surface and air, are now available to the Republic of Korea.

Resumption of international mail service to the Republic of Korea was announced by Order No. 48564 of the Postmaster General published in the POSTAL BULLETIN of November 20, 1951.

Postmasters are requested to see that all concerned at their offices are acquainted with the fact that both regular mail articles and parcel-post packages are acceptable for mailing to the Republic of Korea.

AMERICAN AUTOMOBILE ASSOCIATION, SAFETY PROGRAM, ACCIDENT PRE-VENTION COMMEMORATIVE POSTAGE STAMP

The Department is preparing to issue a 3-cent commemorative stamp to promote highway safety and accident prevention. It will be accorded first day sale through the Chicago, Ill., post office on March 4, 1952, which is the fiftieth anniversary of the American Automobile Association.

The stamp will be 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimensions, arranged horizontally, printed by the rotary process, electric-eye perforated, and issued in sheets of 50. The color of the stamp will be blue. An initial printing order of 115,000,000 American Automobile Association Safety Patrol commemorative stamps has been authorized.

The design of the stamp illustrates a school safety patrol member preventing two young school girls from effecting a dangerous crossing. To the right of this is shown an automobile of the period of 1902, and an automobile of the more familiar and modern design of 1952. The wording "American Automobile Association 50th Anniversary 1902 1952" in dark gothic, is arranged in four lines at the top of the stamp. A two-tone panel | Services." forms the bottom of the stamp and frames the wording "U. S. Postage 36": in white face Roman. In the upper right-hand corner is shown the emblem

Stamp collectors desiring first day cancellations of this stamp may send a limited number of addressed envelopes, not in excess of 10, to the Postmaster, Chicago, Ill., with money order remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed. Postage stamps and personal checks will not be accepted in payment.

Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size, and each must be properly addressed. An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope, and the flap either sealed or turned in. An outside envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. The envelope to the Postmaster, Chicago, Ill., should be endorsed "First Day Covers." Collectors should refrain from requesting hand cancellations, since covers will be machine canceled so far as practicable. Orders for first-day covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps.

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the 3-cent American Automobile Association Safety Patrol commemorative stamp will be available at the Philatelic Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., on and after March 5, 1952. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the agency should include no other stamp issues. The Philatelic Agency does not service first-day covers.

Postmasters at direct- and central-accounting post offices will receive an initial supply of the American Automobile Association Safety Patrol commemorative stamps on orders prepared in the Department. Therefore, postmasters at these offices will not submit requisitions for the same. Direct- and central-accounting postmasters are furnished commemorative stamps as fast as they can be manufactured. They are, therefore, requested to refrain from reporting the nonreceipt of shipments until a reasonable time has elapsed after the first day of issue.

Postmasters at district accounting post offices may obtain needed quantities of the 3-cent American Automobile Association Safety Patrol commemorative stamps by requisition on the central-accounting postmaster.

Postmasters will please post a copy of this notice on the bulletin board, give information to the press, and notify all local stamp clubs regarding the issuance of the 3-cent American Automobile Association Safety Patrol commemorative stamp.

Postmasters are cautioned not to place the stamp herein announced on sale before March 5, 1952.

ISSUE OF MONEY ORDERS FOR PAYMENT IN THE REPUBLIC OF THE PHILIPPINES, CANADA, AND OTHER COUNTRIES

It has come to attention that at a number of post offices in this country, money orders payable by the Republic of the Philippines are still being issued on domestic forms.

Attention is invited to the Postal Bulletin notices of January 23 and March 27, 1951, concerning the suspension of domestic money-order service with the Philippines, effective February 1, 1951, and the operation of international service with that country commencing April 1, 1951.

Therefore, postmasters should remind their clerks that domestic moneyorder forms must not be used when the amounts are intended for payment in any of the countries with which business is transacted on the international basis.

The Postal Administration of Canada calls to attention that numerous money orders issued in this country do not have the word "CANADA" written on the face of the orders in accordance with instructions in the POSTAL BULLETIN and the pamphlet covering the new Domestic Money-Order System. Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands of the United States, Canton Island, Guam, Tutuila and Manua and islands of the Samoan group east of longitude 171° west of Greenwich, Midway Island, Wake Island, and the Canal Zone are included in the term 'Possessions of the United States.' Domestic rates also apply to matter sent to or from post offices in the Caroline, Marshall, and Mariana Islands of the Trust Territory.

"Note.—See Manual of Instructions for Postal Personnel for list of territories and possessions of the United States to which domestic rates apply." LIMIT OF WEIGHT AND SIZE OF MAIL MATTER

"§130.32a Disclosure of Classified Information.—(a) Whoever knowingly and willfully communicates, furnishes, transmits, or otherwise makes available to an unauthorized person, or publishes, or uses in any manner prejudicial to the safety or interest of the United States or for the benefit of any foreign government to the detriment of the United States any classified information * * * Shall be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than ten years, or both." (65 Stat. 719; 18 U. S. C. 798.)

In Part 130—Crimes and Offenses, insert a new section 130.33a to read as follows:

"§ 130.33a Extortion by Officers or Employees of the United States .-Whoever, being an officer, or employee of the United States or any department or agency thereof, or representing himself to be or assuming to act as such, under color or pretense of office or employment commits or attempts an act of extortion, shall be fined not more than \$5,000 or imprisoned not more than three years, or both; but if the amount so extorted or demanded does not exceed \$100, he shall be fined not more than \$500 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both." (62 Stat. 740, 65 Stat. 720; 18 U.S. C. 872.)
