### DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY—BUREAU OF FACILITIES

ORDER No. 55582; DATED MARCH 2, 1954.

- (a) Pursuant to authority of section 1 (b) of Reorganization Plan No. 3 of 1949 (63 Stat. 1066), all functions and duties heretofore vested in the Purchasing Agent for the Post Office Department are hereby transferred to the Assistant Postmaster General, Bureau of Facilities, who is hereby authorized to delegate to any officer or employee under his jurisdiction such of the functions and duties, transferred by this order, as he deems appropriate, except that the authority with respect to the "PROCUREMENT OF SUPPLIES AND SERVICES BY THE POSTMASTER GENERAL FOR IMPROVEMENT OF POSTAL OPERATIONS AND OTHER ACTIVITIES," delegated by the Administrator of General Services under date of April 10, 1951 (see Order No. 45931 of the Postmaster General, dated April 17, 1951, published in the Postal Bulletin of April 19, 1951), to the extent it is subject to redelegation, may be performed by a chief procurement officer for the Post Office Department designated by the Assistant Postmaster General, Bureau of Facilities.
- (b) The office of Purchasing Agent is hereby abolished: Provided. That the office of Purchasing Agent, or such a form thereof as the Assistant Postmaster General, Bureau of Facilities, deems to be in the best interests of the Department, may be established by the Assistant Postmaster General, Bureau of Facilities, on his own order, as a division or other unit of the Bureau of Facilities.
- (c) All regulations, orders, instructions, and delegations of functions and duties in conflict with this order, or in conflict with such regulations, order, instructions, and delegations of functions and duties which may be reafter be made by the Assistant Postmaster General, Bureau of Facilities, under authority of this order, are hereby modified to the extent of such inconsistency.

#### Disposal of Stocks of Obsolete Forms

Pursuant to instructions appearing in the Postal Bulletin dated March 11, 1954, the following blank obsolete forms on hand in any post office, other using office or supply point, in any quantity, should be disposed of immediately as waste material:

- B/A 47 Statement of official matter mailed free of postage, under the penalty privilege. (Destroy editions prior to 9-53. Form no longer used by postmasters; other Government agencies supplied by Controller.)
  - 93 Report of Investigating Officer (Standard Form).
  - 521 Routing slip for correspondence forwarded to the Department. (Not to be confused with currently assigned Form 521, "Request on Regional Accounting Office to furnish photostat of money Order, 5-53 edition.")
  - 1098 Outward waybill, for use with regulation screen wagon service. (Not to be confused with Standard Form 1098, "Schedule of canceled checks.")
  - 3874 Numbered station report of domestic registered, insured, and c. o. d. mail, etc., with printing date earlier than September 1953. Card Form 3874, revised 9-53, will continue to be used; however, it will hereafter be listed as B/A-834 due to renumbering.

In addition to the above, Form 950 T/F, "Book—Daily Savings Bond Cash and Stock Summary," is not being reprinted. Any unused books on hand should be sent to your central accounting postmaster for redistribution where needed.

# ENDORSEMENT OF UNNUMBERED INSURED PARCELS

It has been brought to attention that many unnumbered parcels insured at the 5- and 10-cent fees are being improperly endorsed with the "Insured No. \_\_\_\_\_ stamp, and as a result delivery receipts for such parcels are being obtained unnecessarily at offices of address.

Postmasters and supervisory employees should take action to assure that unnumbered insured parcels are properly endorsed by both accepting employees and firm mailers with the elliptical insured stamp, appropriately modified by cutting off the work "Minimum," and the 5- or 10-cent fee paid entered within the insurance endorsement.

# MATTER BEARING REQUEST FOR NOTICE ON FORM 3547

It has come to attention that some post offices are erroneously rating undeliverable third-class pieces with 3 cents postage due where such matter is returned to sender endorsed with the new address of the addressee or reason for nondelivery in lieu of sending a notice on Form 3547.

In such cases postage shall be collected from the sender at the rate chargeable on the piece returned. The increase to 3 cents in the charge for notice on Form 3547 which became effective February 1, 1954, does not apply when the mailing piece is returned to sender.

Employees handling undeliverable matter bearing request for notice on Form 3547 are reminded of the importance of supplying legible and complete new addresses, if available, or the reason for nondelivery. Identifying key

numbers shall always be furnished if shown on the mailing piece. In disposing of the mail care must be exercised in the treatment of matter bearing the sender's pledge to pay forwarding postage. In every case where a new address is known and the mail bears the sender's forwarding postage guarantee, the matter shall be forwarded after notice of the new address is furnished on Form 3547. Form 3547 shall not be used for any purpose other than to furnish the sender with a new address for the addressee of third- or fourth-class matter.

Postmasters shall promptly examine the manner in which mail undeliverable as addressed bearing the inscription "Form 3547 Requested" is being handled at their respective offices and take corrective action where necessary. Employees assigned to this work should be familiar with the instructions in VI-130, POM, and they shall be adequately supervised to insure that such instructions are followed.

Effective on or about April 25, 1954, air mail service will be inaugurated at Auburn-Geneva, N. Y., on route A. M. 94.

Special cachet will be provided for Auburn and Geneva, and the usual treatment of philatelic mail will be authorized.

First-flight air-mail covers sent to the postmasters at Auburn and Geneva must be prepaid at the appropriate air-mail postage rate. Double postal cards and double post cards intended for return reply purposes are not acceptable as first-flight covers. All covers should be accompanied by a provisions of section 71.2 (e), Postal Laws and Regulations.

letter authorizing the holding of the covers for the first flight and requesting the application of the cachet. Space approximately 2½ by 2½ inches to the left on the address side of all covers is required for the cachet.

An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope to obtain better impression of the cachet and postmark, and to prevent damage to cover or canceling machine.

First-flight air-mail covers sent to the postmaster at Keene must be prepaid at the appropriate air mail postage rate. Double postal cards and double post cards intended for return reply purposes are not acceptable as first-flight covers. All covers should be accompanied by a letter authorizing the holding of the covers for the first flight and requesting the application of the cachet. Space approximately 2½ by 2½ inches to the left on the address side of all covers is required for the cachet.

An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope to obtain better impression of the cachet and postmark, and to prevent damage to cover or canceling machine.

No provision will be made for point-to-point covers. However, at request of collectors, covers receiving cachet will be given directional service only to an office designated by the General Superintendent, Postal Transportation Service, and served by the first flight in each direction, and will there be backstamped and dispatched onward to destination.

#### 3-CENT NEBRASKA TERRITORIAL COMMEMORATIVE POSTAGE STAMP

The Department will issue a 3-cent stamp to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the Nebraska Territory, through the Nebraska City, Nebr., post office, on May 7, 1954.

The stamp will be 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimensions, arranged horizontally with a single outline frame, printed by the rotary process, electric-eye perforated and issued in sheets of 50. The color of the stamp will be purple. The printing of 110,000,000 Nebraska Territorial commemorative stamps has been authorized.



The central design of the stamp is a reproduction of "The Sower," which surmounts the dome of the capitol at Lincoln, Nebr. In the background is a view of the impressive Mitchell Pass with Scotts Bluff dominating the right side of the scene. The numberals "1854" and "1954" in dark gothic are placed in the upper left and right corners, respectively. In the lower right corner appears the denomination "3¢" and "U. S. Postage" in two lines and placed across the bottom is the wording "Nebraska Territorial Centennial" all in white-face gothic.

Stamp collectors and dealers desiring first day cancellations of the stamp may send a reasonable number of addressed envelopes to the Postmaster, Nebraska City, Nebr., with money-order remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed. Postage stamps and personal checks will not be accepted in payment.

Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed. An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either sealed or turned in. An outside envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. The envelope to the Postmaster, Nebraska City, Nebr., should be endorsed "First-Day Covers." Collectors should refrain from requesting hand cancellations since covers will be machine canceled so far as practicable. Orders for first-day covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps.

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the 3-cent Nebraska Territorial commemorative stamp will be available at the Philatelic Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., on and after May 10, 1954. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the Agency should include no other stamp issues. The Philatelic Agency does not service first-day covers.

Postmasters at direct- and central-accounting post offices will receive an initial supply of the 3-cent Nebraska Territorial commemorative stamps on orders prepared in the Department. Therefore, postmasters at these offices will not submit requisitions for same. Direct- and central-accounting postmasters are furnished commemorative stamps as fast as they can be manufactured. They are, therefore, requested to refrain from reporting the nonreceipt of shipments until a reasonable time has elapsed after the first day of issue.

Postmasters at district accounting offices may obtain needed quantities of the 3-cent Nebraska Territorial commemorative stamps by requisition on their central office.

Postmasters will please post a copy of this notice on the bulletin board, give information to the press, and notify all local stamp clubs regarding the issuance of the 3-cent Nebraska Territorial commemorative stamp.

Postmasters are cautioned not to place the stamp herein announced on sale before May 8, 1954.
