# 3-cent Lewis and Clark Commemorative Stamp

The Department will issue a 3-cent stamp to commemorate the 150th anniversay of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, through the Sioux City, Iowa, post office, on July 28, 1954. It was at Sioux City that Sgt. Charles Floyd, a member of the expedition, died and was buried, and at which place a monument has been erected in his memory.



The stamp will be 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimension, arranged horizontally with a single outline frame, printed by the rotary process, electric-eye perforated, and issued in sheets of 50. The color of the stamp will be brown. The printing of 115,000,-000 Lewis and Clark Expedition stamps has been authorized.

The central design of the stamp portrays the landing of Lewis and Clark on the banks of the Missouri River preparatory to going into the expedition's winter quarters. The main figures, Lewis in the foreground and Clark directly behind him, are drawn from the Lewis and Clark Monument (Charles Keck, sculptor) in Charlottesville, Va.

Behind them stands the Shoshone Indian girl Sacagawea, taken from the statue of Sacagawea (Leonard Crunelle, sculptor) in the State capitol grounds at Bismarck, N. Dak. The Indian heroine accompanied Lewis and Clark on the expedition, and the Bird Woman, as she was known, is remembered chiefly for her aid in securing the friendship of the

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# Statue of Liberty Stamp To Be Issued in 3-Cent Coils

The Department will issue the 3-cent Statue of Liberty In God We Trust stamp in coils, sidewise perforated, through the Washington, D. C., post office, on July 20, 1954.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the new 3-cent coil stamp may send a reasonable number of addressed envelopes, with money-order remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster at Washington, D. C. Postage stamps and personal checks will not be accepted in payment. An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either sealed or turned in. An outside envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. The envelope to the Postmaster at Washington, D. C., should be endorsed First-Day Covers. Collectors should refrain from requesting hand cancellations, since covers will be machine-canceled so far as practicable. Orders for first-day covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps.

For the benefit of collectors, coil stamps of the new design will also be placed on sale the same date at the Philatelic Agency.

To insure the receipt of the new design coils, postmasters at direct and central post offices should endorse their initial requisition: New Series. However, when remaining stocks of the old design coils on hand in the Department are exhausted, requisitions will be automatically filled with the new design.

Postmasters will please post a copy of this notice on the bulletin board, give information to the press, and notify all local stamp clubs regarding the issuance of the new 3-cent Statue of Liberty stamp in coils.

Postmasters are cautioned not to place the new design coils herein announced on sale before July 21, 1954.

#### Lewis and Clark—Con.

Shoshone Indians and in guiding the expedition over the Great Divide.

When Sacagawea reached the Great Divide she was reunited with the Shoshones from whom she had been kidnapped previously. It was through her efforts that Lewis and Clark were able to get ponies from the Shoshones to continue their overland journey. Behind Sacagawea is shown the figure of her husband, Charbonneau, a French Canadian trapper and interpreter. The keelboat shown in the middle foreground was drawn from the description as given in the book Lewis and Clark, by John Bakeless.

The wording Lewis and Clark Expedition, 1804, 1954 is arranged in two lines across the top of the stamp in dark modified roman. Arranged across the bottom of the stamp in one line appears United States Postage in white-face gothic and the denomination 3¢ in modified

white-face roman.

Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the stamp may send a reasonable number of addressed envelopes to the Postmaster, Sioux City, Iowa, with money order remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed. Postage stamps and personal checks will not be accepted in payment.

Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed. An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either sealed or turned in. An outside envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. The envelope to the Postmaster, Sioux City, Iowa, should be endorsed First Day Covers.

Collectors should refrain from requesting hand cancellations since covers will be machine canceled so far as practicable. Orders for firstday covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps.

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the 3-cent Lewis and Clark Expedition commemorative stamp will be available at the Philatelic Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., on and after July 29, 1954. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the agency should include no other stamp issues. The Philatelic Agency does not service first-day covers.

Postmasters at direct and central post offices will receive an initial supply of the 3-cent Lewis and Clark Expedition commemorative stamps on orders prepared in the Depart-Therefore, postmasters at these offices will not submit requisitions for same. Direct and central postmasters are furnished commemorative stamps as fast as they can be manufactured. They are, therefore, requested to refrain from reporting the nonreceipt of shipments until a reasonable time has elapsed after the first day of issue.

Postmasters at fixed credit offices may obtain needed quantities of the 3-cent Lewis and Clark Expedition commemorative stamps by requisition on their central office.

Postmasters will please post a copy of this notice on the bulletin board, give information to the press, and notify all local stamp clubs regarding the issuance of the 3-cent Lewis and Clark Expedition commemorative stamp.

Postmasters are cautioned not to place the stamp herein announced on sale before July 29, 1954.
