New Stamp Issues To Meet Increase in Postage Rates

The Department will issue the following items on July 31, 1958, to meet the increases in postage rates which become effective August 1, 1958:

POSTMASTERS SHALL NOT PLACE THE ADHESIVE STAMPS DESCRIBED BELOW ON SALE BEFORE AUGUST 1, 1958

7-CENT AIRMAIL STAMP

The 7-cent Airmail stamp will be first placed on sale at Philadelphia, Pa., on the occasion of the annual convention of the American Airmail Society.



This stamp will be 0.75 by 0.87 of an inch in dimension, arranged vertically, printed by the rotary process, electric-eye perforated, and issued in *sheets of 100*. The color of the stamp will be blue.

The central design features a silhoutte view of the wing spread and fuselage of a composite jet airliner of the most advanced type which will soon be in commercial use on the nation's major airlines.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the 7-cent Airmail stamp may send addressed envelopes to the Postmaster at Philadelphia 4, Pa. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 7c Airmail Stamp."

7-CENT AIRMAIL STAMPED ENVELOPE

The 7-cent embossed Airmail Stamped Envelope will be first placed on sale at Dayton, Ohio. The design is identical to that of the 6-cent envelope except for the value. The color will be a deep blue.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations may submit orders to the Postmaster, Dayton 1, Ohio, plainly indicating full name and address, with a remittance to cover the cost, which is 8ϕ each. Addressed gummed labels may be submitted to be affixed to the envelopes, if desired. The outside envelope to the Postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 7ϕ Envelope."

7-CENT AIRMAIL COIL STAMP

The 7-cent Airmail Coil stamp, horizontally perforated, will be first placed on sale at Miami, Fla. The design of this stamp is identical to the 7-cent Airmail stamp described above.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations of this stamp may send addressed envelopes to the Postmaster, Miami 31, Fla. It is recommended that no more than two stamps be requested for affixment to each cover as it is practically impossible to attractively cancel a longer strip. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 7¢ Coil Stamp."

7-CENT AIRMAIL BOOKS

The 7-cent Airmail Stamp Booklet will be first released through the San Antonio, Tex., post office. The booklet will consist of two panes of six stamps each interleaved with paraffin paper and will sell for 85¢ each. The design is identical to the 7-cent Airmail stamp described above.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations may send addressed envelopes to the Postmaster at San

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All Post Offices

Disposition of Obsolete and Slow-moving Stamps and Stamped Paper

Certain denominations and types of stamp stock will become obsolete or the local demand will be reduced incident to change of rates August 1, 1958.

Consideration should be given to the retention of 3¢ stamps for sale during the holiday season even though it will result in inventory in excess of established limits.

The Department does not contemplate overprinting postal cards to revalue them to the new rates; however, plans are being made for the revaluation of stamped envelopes in full carton quantities. Cartons containing 5,000 or more stamped envelopes, for which there is no immediate demand, should be held pending further instructions.

Any other stock on hand for which no local demand can be foreseen may be disposed of at full value in accordance with instructions in section 424.3 of the Postal Manual.

Departmental approval for full value redemption is not required except in case of matter redeemed from the public.—Bureau of Finance, 6-

Antonio 5, Tex. Covers will be serviced only with full panes of 6 stamps, thus requiring a remittance of 42¢ for each cover submitted. The booklet panes will measure approximately 3¾ by 1¾ inches in dimension, with the panes arranged horizontally (3 stamps wide, 2 deep). A space conforming with these dimensions should be left in the upper right corner of each envelope for the affixment of the pane. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 7¢ Airmail Booklet Panes."

5-CENT AIRMAIL STAMP

The 5-cent Airmail stamp will be first placed on sale at the Colorado Springs, Colo., post office. Although this new airmail stamp is being issued primarily for the convenience of patrons desiring to send souvenir post cards by airmail, it will be valid for use in combination with other stamps on any mail intended for transmission by airmail.

The design is identical to that of the current 4-cent Airmail stamp with the exception of the denomination and the color of the new 5-cent stamp will be red in contrast to the blue 4-cent issue.

Collectors may send addressed post cards to the Postmaster at Colorado Springs, Colo., to obtain first-day cancellations of this stamp. This 5-cent stamp will not be valid for postage on an envelope unless additional postage has been previously affixed to meet the airmail letter rate. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 5¢ Airmail Stamp."

5-CENT AIRMAIL CARD

The new 5-cent Airmail Postal Card will be placed on first day sale at Wichita, Kans. The design of the stamp imprinted on the card is similar to the 4-cent airmail stamp for post cards currently in use, with the new value. The color of the stamp will be red.

To obtain first-day cancellations of the new 5-cent Airmail Postal Card, collectors should submit orders to the Postmaster at Wichita, Kans., plainly indicating full name and address with remittance to cover the face value of the cards. Addressed gummed labels may be submitted. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 5¢ Airmail Card."

4-CENT LINCOLN COIL STAMP

The 4-cent Lincoln stamp (lavender) in coils will be first placed on sale at Mandan, N. Dak. The design is identical to the 4-cent issue of the regular series currently in use.

Stamp collectors may obtain cancellations of the 4-cent Lincoln Coiled stamps (placed side by side and vertically perforated) by sending addressed envelopes to the postmaster at Mandan, N. Dak. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 4¢ Coil Stamp."

4-CENT LINCOLN STAMP BOOKS

The 4-cent Lincoln (regular series) booklet will be first placed on sale at the Wheeling, W. Va., post office. The books will consist of 4 panes of 6 stamps each interleaved with paraffin paper and will sell for 97ϕ .

Collectors desiring cancellations of the 4-cent Lincoln Booklet Panes may send addressed envelopes to the postmaster at Wheeling, W. Va. Covers will be serviced with full panes of 6 stamps only, thus requiring a remittance of 24¢ for each cover submitted. The booklet panes will measure approximately 3¾ by 1¾ inches in dimension, with pane arranged vertically (2 stamps wide and 3 deep). Covers should be addressed low and as far to the left as possible. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 4¢ Lincoln Booklet Panes."

4-CENT FRANKLIN EMBOSSED ENVELOPE

The 4-cent Franklin embossed stamped envelope will be first released through the Montpelier, Vt., post office. The stamp on the envelope will be printed in lavender and the design will feature a profile of Benjamin Franklin, facing to the left of the envelope.

To obtain first-day cancellations of the 4-cent Franklin embossed stamped envelopes, collectors should submit orders to the Postmaster at Montpelier, Vt., plainly indicating full name and address to be applied to each envelope, with a remittance to cover the cost which is 5¢ each. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 4¢ Envelope." Addressed gummed labels may be submitted to be affixed to the envelopes, if desired.

6-CENT REPLY-PAID POSTAL CARD

The 6-cent Reply-Paid Statue of Liberty "In God We Trust" (double) Postal Card will be first released through the Boise, Idaho, post office. The stamp on each card will be printed in purple and the design will be identical.

Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancellations of this card may submit orders to the Postmaster at Boise, Idaho, plainly indicating full name and address, with remittance to cover the face value of the cards. Addressed gummed labels may be submitted to be affixed to the card, if desired. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 6¢ Reply Card.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the above items should send a remittance in the form of a postal money order to the respective postmasters. An outside envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. Collectors should refrain from requesting hand cancellations since covers will be machine canceled so far as practicable. Orders to postmasters must not include requests for uncanceled items.

PHILATELIC SALES AGENCY

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the 7-cent Airmail stamp, the 7-cent Airmail coiled stamp, the 5-cent Airmail stamp, and the 4-cent Lincoln coiled stamp, will be available at the Philatelic Sales Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., on and after August 1, 1958. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the agency should include no other stamp issues other than the four items shown above. The Philatelic Sales Agency does not service first-day covers.

REQUISITIONS

7-Cent Airmail Stamp

Postmasters at first-class post offices requiring this issue in lots of 50,000, or multiples thereof, will requisition it from the Office of Industrial Services, Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Washington 25, D. C. Those offices requiring less than 50,000 may obtain this stamp by submitting requisitions to their regional distributing office.

7-Cent Airmail Stamped Envelope

See detailed instructions for ordering in Postal Bulletin of June 12, 1958.

7-Cent Airmail Coils

Postmasters at first-class post offices requiring this issue in lots of 50 coils of 500 each, and 8 coils of 3,000 each, or multiples thereof, will requisition it from the Office of Industrial Services, Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Washington 25, D. C. Those requiring less may obtain them by submitting requisitions to their regional distributing office.

7-Cent Airmail Books

First-class post offices should requisition this item in lots of 1,500, or multiples thereof, from the Bureau of Engraving and Printing in the usual manner. Those offices requiring smaller quantities may obtain them from their regional distributing office.

5-Cent Airmail Stamp

Requisition same as 7-cent Airmail stamp.

5-Cent Airmail Postal Card and 6-Cent Reply Paid (Double) Postal Card

Postmasters requiring postal cards totaling a truckload shall submit their requisitions to the Division of Supplies, Bureau of Facilities, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C. A truckload consists of 3,750,000 cards shipped to offices east of the Mississippi River and 5,500,000 cards shipped to offices west of the Mississippi River.

Postmasters requiring postal cards in less than truckload lots should submit their requisitions to their regional distributing offices. These items will be shipped as soon as manufacturing and distributing facilities permit.

4-Cent Lincoln Coils

Postmasters at first-class post offices requiring this stamp in lots of 200 coils of 100 stamps each, 50 coils of 500 each, and 8 coils of 3,000 each, will requisition them from the Bureau of Engraving and Printing in the usual manner. Those offices requiring lesser quantities will requisition them from their regional distributing office.

4-Cent Lincoln Books

Requisition same as 7-cent Airmail books.

4-Cent Franklin Embossed Envelope

See detailed instructions for ordering in Postal Bulletin of June 12, 1958.

Postmasters shall post a copy of this notice on the bulletin board and give information to the press regarding the issuance of the above-described items.—Office of the Special Assistant to the Postmaster General, 6-19-58.

Mailing Articles Abroad

The Department has been receiving numerous inquiries from business firms and individuals domiciled in the United States concerning the legality of mailing, or having mailed on their behalf, in other countries various publications, advertising matter, or circulars addressed to persons or firms in the United States.

Article VII of the Final Protocol of the Universal Postal Convention states:

No country is bound to forward or deliver to addressees articles which senders domiciled in its territory mail or cause to be mailed in a foreign country with a view to benefiting from the lower rates which are established there. The rule applies without distinction either to articles prepared in the country inhabited by the sender and then transported across the border or to articles prepared in the foreign country. The Administration concerned has the right either to return the articles in question to origin or to charge them with its domestic postage rates. The methods of collecting the charges are left to its discretion.

Postmasters are requested to bring the above to the attention of all persons or concerns known to be making All Post Offices in Cities Over 25,000 Population

Standard Form 123, Office Space Report

Under instructions currently in effect postmasters in cities of over 25,000 population submit periodic reports to General Services Administration on Standard Form 123 covering certain categories of office space used for post office purposes in Federal buildings which are not exclusively postal.

Pursuant to advice from General Services Administration under date of May 21, 1958, postmasters are advised that the submission of Standard Form 123, as of June 30, 1958, is modified to require preparation of the report as of September 30, 1958.—

or planning to make such mailings, or who inquire about the possibility of making mailings of this kind.

If exchange offices observe any letters or prints which appear to have been mailed abroad by or on behalf of a United States firm or individual, they will hold the articles and report promptly to the Director, International Service Division, Bureau of Transportation, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., furnishing a specimen of the mailing.

If such letters or prints are found to have been mailed at lower postage rates than would apply had the articles been mailed in the United States, they will be returned to origin unless the mailer pays the applicable domestic postage.


The restrictions mentioned are not applied to mailings made by permanent branches or permanent representatives of United States firms which are maintained in other countries, or to mailings by foreign firms having permanent branches or permanent representatives in the United States. Care must be exercised not to withhold articles in this category. However, in case of doubt report should be made to the Department as provided in the preceding paragraph.—Bureau of Transportation, 6–19–58.



Simon Bolivar Commemorative Postage Stamps

The Department will issue a 4-cent and an 8-cent Simon Bolivar commemorative stamp, the second in the "Champions of Liberty" series, through the Washington, D. C., post office, on July 24, 1958.

POSTMASTERS SHALL NOT PLACE THESE STAMPS ON SALE BEFORE JULY 25, 1958





The stamps will be 0.85 by 0.98 of an inch in dimension (Famous American size), arranged vertically. The 4-cent denomination will be issued in penes of 70 (7 across and 10 deep) while the 8-cent denomination will be issued in penes of 72 (8 across by 9 deep). The 4-cent denomination will be printed on the Cottrell press in a single color—ocher, and the 8-cent denomination will be printed on the Giori press in red (part of the ribbon, the torch of liberty and the top and bottom wording), blue (part of the ribbon, the leaves and the value), and golden ocher (the medallion). Initial printing orders of 120 million 4-cent and 40 million 8-cent Bolivar stamps have been authorized.

Both stamps will feature the medallion likeness of Simon Bolivar. The wording "1783 Simon Bolivar—The Liberator 1830" encircles the head on the medallion, which is suspended from a ribbon. Directly above the pendant is featured a torch of liberty behind two sprays of leaves. The wording "Champion of Liberty" forms the top of the stamp and "United States Postage" the bottom, both drawn in modified gothic. The denominations are shown in the lower right corners.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the 4-cent and 8-cent Bolivar stamps may send addressed envelopes, together with money order remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster at Washington 13, D. C. Collectors should plainly indicate in the upper right corner of the covers whether the 4-cent or 8-cent denomination is desired.

An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either turned in or sealed. Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed. An envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers Bolivar Stamps." Collectors should refrain from requesting hand cancellations since covers will be machine canceled so far as practicable. Orders for first-day covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps.

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the 4-cent and 8-cent Bolivar commemorative stamps will be available at the Philatelic Sales Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., on and after July 24, 1958. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the agency should include no other stamp issues. The Philatelic Sales Agency does not service first-day covers.

Postmasters at first-class post offices requiring the 4-cent issue in lots of 35,000, and the 8-cent denomination in lots of 36,000, or multiples thereof, will submit **separate requisitions** for each denomination to the Office of Industrial Services, Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Washington 25, D. C. Those offices requiring less than the above quantities may obtain these stamps by submitting requisitions to their regional distributing office.

Postmasters ordering stamps from regional distributing offices should submit separate requisitions for these items about July 14, 1958. Regional distributing office postmasters should submit requisitions promptly upon receipt of this notice.

Postmasters shall post a copy of this notice on the bulletin board and give information to the press regarding the issuance of the 4-cent and 8-cent Simon Bolivar commemorative stamps.—Office of the Special Assistant to the Postmaster General, 6-19-58.

All Post Offices Having Contract Stations and Branches

Agreements for the Conduct of Contract Stations or Branches

Public Law 85–368, 85th Congress, 2d Session, approved April 7, 1958, reads as follows:

The Postmaster General may enter into contracts for the conduct of contract stations for a term not exceeding three years. Any such contract may be renewed by the Postmaster General, at the same or a lower contract price, for additional terms not exceeding three years each unless (1) the Postmaster General finds that such renewal is not in the interest of the United States, or (2) not later than ninety days before the end of any contract term the Post Office Department receives a request in writing that the contract be opened for competitive bidding at the end of such term. Upon any such finding by the Postmaster General, or upon receipt of any such request, the Postmaster General shall terminate the contract, with respect to which such finding has been made or such request has been received, at the end of the current term and shall advertise for bids thereon in accordance with existing laws relating to the advertising of public contracts and the award thereof on the basis of competitive bidding.

For the present all new agreements shall be entered into on the basis of the present contract terms; i. e., for the unexpired portion of the 2-year term July 1, 1957, to July 1, 1959, in the western area, and for the 2-year term or unexpired portion of the 2-year term July 1, 1958, to June 30, 1960, in the eastern area.

Instructions for entering into agreements for 3-year contract terms will be published at a later date.—

Safety Equipment Stocked in Supply Centers

INCREASED POSTAGE RATES

Public Law 85-426, approved May 27, 1958, prescribes various revisions in domestic postal rates and conditions of mailing. The Postal Manual changes set forth in this notice become effective on the dates indicated up to and including August 1, 1958.

Elsewhere in this Bulletin is a poster which shall be detached and placed at stamp windows, letter drops, lobby bulletin boards and other appropriate places for the information of the mailing public.

Reprints of this notice and the poster will be available on or about July 1, 1958 and may be requisitioned from supply centers on special requisition Form 4750 for use in publicizing the new rates and mailing conditions.

New Postal Manual pages embodying the revised regulations in this notice will be issued.

Other rate changes will be effective on January 1, 1959, and subsequent dates. Ample advance notice will be given prior to such dates.

Postal Manual Changes

Effective Immediately Second-Class Mail---

Section 132.223 is changed to read:

132.223 Preparation. Publications must be formed of printed sheets. They may not be produced by stencil, mimeograph, or hectograph process or in imitation of typewriting.

EXPLANATION. This change rescinds the requirement that sheets of second-class publications must be of paper and eliminates the former provision which denied second-class mail privileges for publications having hard cover or other substantial binding.

Section 132.121c is deleted and section 132.121d is redesignated 132.121c.

EXPLANATION. This change eliminates the provision for charging 1¢ for each zone to which a mailing is made when the total weight of an issue or edition therefor does not exceed 1 pound.

Effective July 1, 1958 Second-Class Mail—

Section 132.481 will be changed to read:

132.481 Enclosures. Bills, receipts, and orders for subscriptions may be enclosed either loose or bound in. No other enclosures are permitted. They may be prepared in the following ways:

a. Printed or written.

b. Printed on cards and envelopes, including business replies.

c. Arranged to include coin receptacles.

d. Arranged as combination forms for two or more second-class publications issued by the same publisher.

EXPLANATION. This change elim- Effective August 1, 1958 inates the provision which specified what may be placed on subscription order forms, bills and receipts used as enclosures in secone-class mail. Such change does not permit the inclusion of wording unrelated to a subscription.

Mail for the Blind

In the chart of section 138.1 under the heading Reading Matter for the Blind, there will be added a new item:

Books, or pages thereof, in raised characters, whether prepared by hand or printed, which contain no advertisements, when furnished by any person to a blind person without cost to such blind person.

Section 138.321 will be changed

to read:

138.321 The following may be mailed free of postage when they contain no advertising:

a. Books, pamphlets, and other material published in raised characters or in the form of sound reproduction records or other matter when sent unsealed by public institutions for the blind, or by public libraries as a loan to blind readers or when returned by the readers to such institutions or libraries, and

b. Books or pages thereof in raised characters, whether prepared by hand or printed, when furnished by any person to a blind person without cost to such blind person.

On the address side of each parcel must appear the name and address of the sender in the upper left corner and the word FREE over the words Reading Matter for the Blind or Sound Reproduction Records for the Blind in the upper right corner. No special authorization is required. Weight is limited to 15 pounds for each package.

EXPLANATION. This change will add books or pages of books in raised characters without advertising, furnished to blind persons by individuals without cost to the items for the blind mailable free of postage.

EXPLANATION. This change establishes a uniform increased rate of 12 cents a pound for these publications regardless of the weight.

Third-Class Mail-

The following changes will be made in the chart in section 134.1:

a. Under heading Single Rate for books, catalogs, etc., revise wording to read:

 3ϕ first 2 ounces, $1\frac{1}{2}\phi$ each additional ounce or fraction.

b. Under heading Single Rate for circulars and other printed matter and merchandise revise wording to read:

3¢ first 2 ounces, 11/6¢ each additional ounce or fraction.

c. Change 3¢ to 6¢ in column for articles of odd size or form.

EXPLANATION. These changes establish a uniform single piece (nonbulk) rate of 3¢ for the first 2 ounces and 11/2¢ for each additional ounce for all third-class mail. The minimum postage for third-class articles of odd size or form will be increased to 6¢ per piece. Mailers known to be mailing articles of a size or form which requires this minimum charge shall be promptly informed of this increase to be effective August 1, 1958.

The rate heretofore known as the Book Rate, which has been chargeable on books, 16millimeter films, and 16-millimeter film catalogs, will be increased to 9 cents for the first pound plus 5 cents for each additional pound and extended to the items listed in new subparagraphs c to f in revised section 135.214 effective August 1, 1958.

In order that all of the articles mailed at the special rate for educational materials may be properly identified the regulations have been changed to specify that the cover on each package will be marked Educational Materials. Mailers who have envelopes, wrappers, and labels already printed with the endorsement Book or Book Rate may use them after August 1, 1958 until current stocks are exhausted.

Section 135.14 will be changed to read:

135.14 Library Materials.

(These rates are restricted to public libraries, institutions of learning, and certain nonprofit organizations and associations.)

Section 135.215 will be changed to read:

135.215a The rates in 135.14 apply to the following items when loaned or exchanged between schools, colleges, or universities and public libraries, nonprofit religious, educational, scientific, philanthropic, agricultural, labor, veterans or fraternal organizations or associations or when sent between libraries, organizations or associations stated herein and their members, readers or borrowers:

(1) Books consisting wholly of reading matter or scholarly bibliography or reading matter with incidental blank spaces for students' notations and containing no advertising matter other than incidental announcements of books.

(2) Printed music, whether in bound form or in sheet form.

The rates in 135.14 also apply to: 16-millimeter films, filmstrips, transparencies, slides, microfilms, all of which must be positive prints in final form for viewing; sound recordings; and catalogs of such materials having 24 or more pages, at least 22 of which are printed, when sent to or from schools, colleges, universities, or public libraries, and to or from nonprofit religious, educational, scientific, philanthropic, agricultural, la-

bor, veterans', or fraternal organizations or associations. Section 135.51e will be changed

to read:

135.51e. The wrapper or cover on articles mailed at the rates in 135.14 must be marked Library Materials.

Section 135.9 will be changed to

135.9. Library Materials—Identification of Mailer or Addressee. Each parcel mailed under the provisions of sections 135.14 and 135.215 must show in the address or the return address the name of a school, college, university, public library, or the name of a nonprofit religious, educational, scientific, philanthropic, agricultural, labor, veterans', or fraternal organization or association. No permit is required.

permit is required.
EXPLANATION. The rate here-tofore known as the Library Book

Rate will be extended to include additional materials effective August 1, 1958. After that date the endorsement Library Book or Library Rate will no longer be used on the wrapper or envelope but a new endorsement, Library Materials, will be required. Wrappers, envelopes and labels already printed with the old endorsement may be used after August 1, 1958 until stocks are exhausted.

The third-zone limitation on mailings at the special rate for library materials will be removed. This rate will apply to mailings anywhere in the domestic service

effective August 1, 1958.

The conditions under which the items in section 135.215b are mailed will not change except for the elimination of the distance limitations. However, the materials described in 135.215a may be accepted only when sent as a loan or exchange between schools, colleges, universities and the non-profit libraries and organizations or associations listed or when sent between the nonprofit libraries, organizations or associations listed and their members, readers, or borrowers.

Section 135.213 will be changed to read:

135.213 Catalogs and similar printed advertising matter in bound form, having 24 or more pages, at least 22 of which are printed, weighing 16 ounces or more but not exceeding 10 pounds, and individually addressed, may be mailed at the zone rates in 135.12.

The first sentence in section 135.31 will be amended to read:

135.31 Weight. Each addressed piece must weigh 16 ounces or more but not in excess of the following limits:

EXPLANATION. The new minimum weight for fourth-class mail will be 16 ounces. The one pound rate will be applicable only to parcels weighing exactly 16 ounces. If the weight is less the third-class rate will be applicable.
