## Oregon Statehood Centennial Commemorative Postage Stamp

The Department will issue a 4-cent stamp to commemorate the centennial anniversary of Oregon Statehood through the Astoria, Oreg., post office, on February 14, 1959.

POSTMASTERS SHALL NOT PLACE THIS STAMP ON SALE BEFORE FEBRUARY 15, 1959



The stamp will be 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimension, arranged horizontally, printed by the rotary process, electric-eye perforated, and issued in sheets of 50. The color of the stamp will be blue-green. An initial printing of 120,000,000 has been authorized.

The central subject of the stamp is an unhorsed covered wagon, typical of those used over the Oregon Trail by the early settlers, with Mount Hood to the right. The terrain slopes to the left, or west, meeting the Pacific Ocean. In the upper portion of the design, in dark gothic lettering arranged in two lines, is "Oregon Statehood 1859–1959." In the sky, to the left of the wagon, is a white star, symbolizing Statehood, while across the bottom, in white gothic lettering against a solid background, is "U. S. Postage 4 Cents."

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the 4-cent Oregon State-hood commemorative stamp may send addressed envelopes, together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Post-master at Astoria, Oreg. Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed. An envelope must not be sent for return of first day covers. Collectors should refrain from requesting hand cancellations since

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the 4-cent Oregon Statehood centennial commemorative stamp will be available at the Philatelic Sales Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., on and after February 16, 1959. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the Agency should include no other stamp issues. The Philatelic Sales Agency does not service first day covers.

Postmasters are reminded of the notice by the Postmaster General in the September 11, 1958, issue of the Postal Bulletin requiring postmasters to submit requisitions for each new stamp issue as announced in the Postal Bulletin so that

## Gross Postal Receipts for Calendar Year 1958

I. Introduction

Postmasters will submit again this year a special statement of account (Form 1553 or 1555) showing the actual cumulative amounts in their cash books for all accounts as of the close of business December 31, 1958. Regional controllers will use these amounts together with authorized deductions for outside sales in adjusting gross postal receipts for calendar year 1958 to exclude the effect of rate increases as required by Public Law 85–426.

II. Special Statement of Account for Computing Gross Postal Receipts

A. Prepare special statement of account as indicated and mail to reach regional controller not later than January 6, 1959.

Postmasters at first-class post offices requiring this issue in lots of 25,000, or multiples thereof, will requisition these stamps immediately from the Office of Industrial Services, Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Washington 25, D. C. Offices requiring less than 25,000 stamps shall submit requisitions immediately to their Regional Distributing Office.

Postmasters shall post a copy of this notice on the bulletin board and give information to the press regarding the issuance of the 4-cent Oregon Statehood commemorative stamp.— Office of the Special Assistant to the Postmaster General, 12-18-58.

Complete front of statement of account and sign certification on reverse. Do not attach any supporting papers to the special statement; these will be submitted as usual with the regular statement of account covering the full period (1st-class offices) or quarters (2d-, 3d-, and 4th-class offices) ending January 9, 1959. Follow instructions in Postal Manual 425.3 regarding inventory of stamp stock except that first class offices, which have taken an inventory within five days of December 31, may determine total stamp stock by running totals of Forms 3295 and 3367 instead of actually counting the main stock.

B. Postmasters are also reminded to prepare Form 1568, Outside Sales Report, for the quarter ending December 31, 1958, and submit to regional postal installations manager as prescribed in Postal Manual 321.75.

## Inauguration of Airmail Service, United Air Lines, Inc., AM-1

Effective on or about January 11, 1959, airmail service will be inaugurated over an extension of route AM-1 between Chicago, Ill., and Baltimore, Md., via Columbus, Dayton, Ohio, and Washington, D. C.

Official cachets will be furnished Chicago, Airport Mail Facility Chicago, Columbus, Airport Mail Facility Columbus, Dayton, Washington, Airport Mail Facility Washington and Baltimore.

The usual treatment, outlined in 145.3 Postal Manual, is authorized. Bureau of Transportation, 12-18-58.

1. The reduction for Quarter I of PFY 1959 is smaller because rate change was effective only from

smaller because rate change was effective only from Aug. 1, 1958.

2. The reduction applicable to the 1958 receipts of first-class offices is smaller than for second-, third-, and fourth-class offices because the rates for certain classes of mail (e. g. fourth-class, publishers' second-class, and bulk rate third-class), which originate predominantly at first-class offices were not increased effective Aug. 1, 1958.

3. Other rate changes established by law which become effective at later dates will require different adjustment factors for calendar year 1959 and subsequent periods.

B. The above adjustment factors that will be used to exclude the effect of the new postal rates in computing 1958 gross receipts, are averages developed on a national basis for the two groups of offices, i. e. first-class and all others. Where the revenue at an office is derived predominately from a class or type of mail which would produce more or less than the average revenue increase from rate changes, consideration will be given to such further adjustments as may be found necessary to more accurately reflect the gross All Postal Installations

## Large Mailings of Third-Class Matter and Income Tax Forms in December 1958

The Postal Bulletin of July 17, 1958, directed attention to the need for making arrangements to handle anticipated large volumes of thirdclass matter mailed under the bulk rate during the last week of December, prior to the postage rate increase

on January 1, 1959.

All postal installations are alerted to the fact that in addition to the anticipated heavy volume of thirdclass mail, income tax forms will also be handled during this same period. It is of the utmost importance that plans be made to cope with the heavy volumes of mail during this period in order that there will be no delay in service.

It may be necessary in some instances to continue the employment of Christmas assistants after December 24 in order to handle the expected volumes of mail without delay. Approval of the Regional Operations Director must be requested in such instances.—Bureau of Operations, 12-18-58.

## Bulk Third-Class Mail Rate Increases

Circulars and Merchandise

Postmasters are reminded that effective January 1, 1959, the rate for circulars, other printed matter and merchandise is increased to 16 cents for each pound or fraction when mailed in bulk lots of 200 or more identical pieces (or at least 20 pounds) and prepared as prescribed in 126.2, Postal Manual.

Books and Catalogs

The pound rate for books and catalogs having 24 or more pages (at least 22 of which are printed), seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions, and plants remains at 10 cents for each pound or fraction.

Minimum Charge per Piece

The minimum charge for thirdclass matter mailed at either the 10cent or new 16-cent per pound rate is 2 cents per piece, except that mailings of authorized nonprofit organizations will continue to be accepted at the minimum charge of 1 cent per piece.

Computing Postage

Postmasters accepting bulk thirdclass mailings on and after January 1, 1959, must exercise care in determining whether the pound rate or minimum piece rate is applicable. If 5 pieces, subject to the 10-cent a pound rate, weigh 1 pound or less, charge 2 cents per piece; if the 5 pieces weigh more than 1 pound, charge the pound rate. If 8 pieces, subject to the 16cent a pound rate, weigh 1 pound or less charge 2 cents per piece; if the 8 pieces weigh more than 1 pound, charge the pound rate.

#### Nonprofit Organizations

Mailings by authorized nonprofit organizations which are subject to the 10-cent a pound rate shall be computed as heretofore. Those mailings subject to the 16-cent a pound rate shall be computed by weighing a single piece. If it weighs 1 ounce or less, charge 1 cent per piece; if it weighs more than 1 ounce, charge 16 cents for each pound or fraction of a pound.

Bulk Mailing Fee

The annual bulk mailing fee is increased to \$20 on and after January

## Official Employment Security Mail

Official bulk mailings of Employment Security Agencies which are mailed without stamps affixed under provisions of section 137.4, Postal Manual, may be accepted and dispatched without postmark if the sender requests such treatment. The U. S. Department of Labor will notify all State Employment Security Agencies that they may arrange with local postmasters to dispatch their official mailings without postmark. Adoption of this procedure is optional with each State agency.

Postmasters will continue postmarking this mail until the local State Employment Security office makes request to have their official mailings handled and dispatched without postmark. This authorization is applicable only to matter mailed without stamps affixed bearing the inscription Employment Security Mail—United States Postage Accounted For Under Act of Congress, as provided in section 137.4, Postal Manual.

## U. S. Savings Stamp Gift Books

There is no difference in the front covers on the \$2.50 and \$5.00 U. S. Savings Stamp gift books. However, the value of each book is clearly shown on the back over.

Clerks must use caution in selling these books to avoid the possibility of selling a \$5.00 book for \$2.50. When a new supply is printed covers will be in different colors to aid in selection for sale.—Bureau of Finance, 12-18-58.

## Revised Forms 3541 and 3542—Increased Second-Class Postage Rates

Postmasters at offices having second-class or controlled circulation publications must immediately submit a special requisition on Form 4750 for a sufficient supply of revised Forms 3541, Computation of Second-Class Postage, and 3542, Statement Showing Number of Copies of Second-Class Publication Mailed to last for one requisitioning period.

These forms have been revised to show the increased second-class and controlled circulation postage rates which must be charged effective

January 1, 1959.

The revised forms must be used for all mailings of second-class and controlled circulation publications made after December 31, 1958, except that the current edition (March 1957) of Form 3541 will be used for (1) classroom publications (132.123, Postal Manual) and (2) free matter for the blind (138.322, Postal Manual).

After a supply of revised Forms 3541 and 3542 has been received, dispose of as waste paper all copies of previous editions remaining on hand except at those offices where mailings are made of the classroom or free-for-the-blind publications described above. Postmasters at these offices should dispose of all previous editions of Form 3542 but should con-

C.

The following increased rates are effective January 1, 1959, on mailings outside the county of publication of all second-class publications except those accepted at the special rate or classroom rate:

It should be noted that the reading portion rate formerly collected on "copies outside the county having 5 percent or less advertising" has been eliminated. Effective January 1, 1959, the advertising rates will apply to ALL advertising in the copies. Postmasters are reminded that the provision for charging 1 cent for each zone to which a mailing is made when the total weight of an issue or edition does not exceed 1 pound was eliminated effective May 27, 1958.
