5-Cent Food for Peace— Freedom From Hunger Commemorative Postage Stamp

The Department will issue the 5cent Food for Peace-Freedom from Hunger commemorative postage stamp through the Washington, D.C., post office, on June 4, 1963, to coincide with the opening of the World Food Congress being held June 4– 18 in the Nation's Capital.

The theme of the stamp is a stalk of golden yellow bearded wheat against a background of green. The wording "Freedom from Hunger" is in red, with the remaining lettering in white.

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All WMS Part I and NIMS Post Offices

Manpower and Workload Reconciliation Study and NIMS Collection Test Date

Friday, May 17, has been selected for conducting the quarterly Workload and Manpower Reconciliation Studies in all WMS Part I offices; and for testing the receipt of collection mail in the 294 NIMS offices. Forms 2368-DX, Manhours vs. Workload, for WMS Part I offices; and Forms 2368-A, Collection Receipt, for participating NIMS offices, are to be prepared and submitted in accordance with existing instructions.

With respect to the NIMS collection data, separate reports, in duplicate, (1) for first-class and (2) for third-class, are to be submitted on Form 2368-A to the regional office by each of the participating NIMS post offices by May 24.

Particular reference is made to the fact that the recording of pieces and manhours on Form 2368-DX is by work tours at WMS Part I offices, whereas, the recording of total pieces and percentages on Form 2368-A at all participating NIMS offices is for a 24-hour period starting 1 a.m. (local time), May 17, and ending 1 a.m., May 18.—Bureau of Operations, 5-9-63.

Revised Schedule 6— Schedule of Charges For Stamp Sales

This schedule, which is designed for use by stamp window employees, has been revised to show the charges for purchases of 4-cent, 5-cent and 8-cent postage stamps, in quantities of 1 through 100.

Franking Privilege of Former Presidents

Section 137.7, Postal Manual, is being modified to authorize the acceptance of franked mail of former Presidents for free transmission by air when it is so marked.

Postmasters are instructed to accept and dispatch by air all mail from former Presidents without prepayment of postage which bears the written signature of the sender, or a facsimile signature, together with the words Air Mail.—Bureau of Operations, 5–9–63.

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

1-Cent Regular Postage Stamp in Coils

The Department will issue the 1cent Andrew Jackson regular postage stamp in coil form through the Chicago, Ill., post office, on May 31, 1963, during the Combined Philatelic Exhibition of Chicagoland (COMPEX).

Design identical to 1-cent Jackson in sheet form

To obtain first-day cancellations, collectors may submit requisitions to the Postmaster, Chicago 7, Ill. See Postal Manual section 145.3. To receive the first-day cancellation, envelopes must bear postage at the firstclass rate, or not less than 5-cents. This stamp will be sold at post offices in full coils of 500 and 3,000 only. However, collectors may obtain the 1-cent coil stamp in any quantity desired from the Philatelic Sales Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D.C., on and after June 1, 1963.

First- and second-class offices may requisition a minimum of 50 coils of 500 stamps each (USE ITEM NO. 701) and a minimum of 8 coils of 3,000 stamps each (USE ITEM NO. 707). Such requisitions shall be submitted to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing on Form 3356. Quantities larger than those specified above must be ordered in the multiples listed in Postal Manual sections 422.324b All First-Class Offices

Use of Form 1286, Request for Postal Publications

When requesting an increase or a decrease in the number of publications and handbooks in use, postmasters at first-class offices should use Form 1286, Request for Postal Publications. This form is stocked in the area supply centers and, if needed, should be requisitioned during the next regular requisitioning cycle.

Where an increase is requested, justification must be given on the reverse of the form. Postmasters are requested to review their present quota of publications to assure that distribution is being made on a "need-to-have" basis. If excess copies are being received, prompt notice should be made on Form 1286 to the Directives Management Branch so that the mailing list can be changed.—Office of the Deputy Postmaster General, 5-9-63.

No COD Service to the Canal Zone

The Canal Zone Postal Service has reported the continued receipt of COD parcels dispatched from the United States.

There is no COD service with the Canal Zone, as stated in section 163.26, Postal Manual. Postmasters are requested to take appropriate corrective action to prevent the acceptance and dispatch of COD parcels addressed for delivery in the Canal Zone.—Bureau of Operations, 5-9-63.

and 422.324c. Orders received at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing by May 31 will be filled with the Andrew Jackson stamp. Orders received after the first-day sale will be filled with the current 1-cent Washington coil issue until the supply is exhausted.

Offices requiring 30 coils of 500, or 5 coils of 3,000 stamps, or less, shall submit requisitions on Form 017 to their RDPO. Do not include stamps other than the 1-cent Andrew Jackson on the initial request.

Initial requisitions shall be limited to such quantities as are required to meet the philatelic demands.—Office of the Special Assistant to the Postmaster General, 5-9-63.

All Offices With Rural Routes

Inspection of Rural Routes

The annual inspection of rural routes will not be made in May this year. Inspections will be scheduled for one service day during September.

Rural carriers will furnish postmasters a certified statement showing:

1. The total number of boxes served.

2. The minimum number of vehicle stops required to serve all boxes on the route. Where several boxes grouped together can be served without moving the vehicle, the stop will be counted as one vehicle stop. (See section 755.413b, Postal Manual.)

Postmasters shall mail these statements to the Chief, Delivery Services Branch, regional office, not later than May 31, 1963.—Bureau of Operations, 5–9–63.

able at the Philatelic Sales Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D.C., on and after June 4, 1963.

All classes of post offices will receive an initial supply of this stamp under the automatic distribution schedule.

First- and second-class post offices requiring additional *bulk quantities* may submit a separate requisition (Form 3356) to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (Item 420) with a memorandum, Form 31, stating that the stamps are required in addition to those automatically furnished.

All post offices requiring less than bulk quantities in addition to the automatic distribution may submit a separate requisition (Form 17) to their RDPO and endorse at top "Additional." All requisitions not so endorsed will be returned.

All APO's and FPO's servicing Diplomatic Missions should requisition sufficient quantities of the 5-cent Food for Peace-Freedom from Hunger commemorative stamp to meet their requirements.

Prior to the first day sale date, RDO's should submit a supplemental requisition to cover the anticipated demand by APO's and FPO's.— Office of the Special Assistant to the Postmaster General, 5-9-63.

Revised Procedure for Requisitioning Stamps and Stamped Paper From Regional Distributing Post Offices

Effective July 1, 1963, a new procedure will be established for the shipment of stamps and stamped paper by Regional Distributing Post Offices. Under the new procedure all postmasters will submit regular quarterly requisitions to RDPO's at specified times, and RDPO's will make shipments to post offices in alphabetical sequence based on the names of the post offices rather than on the names of the States in which the post offices are located.

This new procedure will not change the instructions relating to the procurement of bulk quantities of accountable paper from the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, the U.S. Stamped Envelope Agency, and the Bureau of Facilities, nor does it affect the automatic distribution of commemorative stamps. It also does not change the instructions relating to the requisitioning of money order forms, postal savings certificates and United States Savings Bonds. Special instructions for reguisitioning Christmas stamp stock will appear in the Christmas Postal Bulletin.

Under the new procedure some first-class post offices will receive shipments of stamps and stamped paper from RDPO's much later in the quarter than they are now received, and others will receive shipments earlier in the quarter. For example-Yuma, Ariz., which has heretofore received shipments during the first month of the quarter, may not expect to receive quarterly shipments from the RDPO until near the end of the third month in each quarter. Conversely-Aberdeen, Wash., which has heretofore received shipments during the third month of the quarter, may expect to receive shipments from the RDPO early in the first month of each quarter.

Postmasters at first-class offices who requisitioned stamp stock from RDPO's in April and May under the old procedure and who will not receive stamp shipments until August or September under the new procedure, may not have an adequate supply of some postage stocks to meet the expected demands during the changeover period. Also some postmasters at second-, third-, and fourth-class offices who normally would have submitted requisitions in July and August under the old procedure but who will not receive shipments until August or September under the new procedure, may need additional postage stock during the change-over period. In order to supply such needs, provisions are being made for a one-time "Special" requisition to be shipped by RDPO's during the month of June. Postmasters who would have submitted requisitions during the month of June under the old procedure will use the "Special" requisition if they will require additional stock before they receive their first shipments under the new schedules.

Pending revision of Part 422, Chapter IV, Postal Manual, the following instructions shall be observed by postmasters at all classes of post offices in submitting requisitions to Regional Distributing Post Offices for postage and nonpostal stamp stock, stamped envelopes, and postal card stock:

1. Promptly determine the amount of postage and nonpostal stamp stock, if any, which will be required in addition to that on hand and already requisitioned to meet the expected demands of the office up to the estimated time of receipt of the first shipment under the new schedule.

(For the purpose of estimating the probable date of receipt of the first shipment, allow approximately 1 week beginning July 15, 1963, for each two letters in the alphabet above the letter with which the name of the post office begins.)

2. Submit requisitions endorsed "Special—POSTAL BULLETIN May 9, 1963" to RDPO's by no later than June 1, for sufficient supply to meet the needs as determined above for each category of postage and nonpostal stamp stock.

3. Thereafter submit a single requisition for each category of stock listed in section 422.51, Postal Manual in sufficient quantities to meet the needs of the office for a full 3-month period or to bring stock levels up to: (a) A 6-month supply for first-class offices; or, (b) A 5-month supply for second-, third- and fourth-class offi

Settlement of Vehicle Damage Claims

Section 683.2 of the Postal Manual is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Vehicle damage debt claims shall be referred direct to the Office of the General Counsel for presentation to the Department of Justice where (1) the amount of the debt is \$75 or more and all prior efforts to effect collection by field personnel (Postmaster, Regional Controller and the inspection service) have failed; (2) there is an uncollectible balance of \$75 or more; or (3) an offer in compromise is involved, regardless of the amount of the debt."

In section 683.12, relating to "Compromise Settlements", the next to the last word in the first sentence is hereby changed to "further" in lieu of "final".

The Postal Manual will be amended accordingly.—Bureau of Facilities, 5-9-63.

1964 _____ Mar. 16, 1964. Prior to July 1, 1964, each postmaster will be advised of the approximate dates during each subsequent calendar quarter on which all future quarterly shipments will be planned, together with instructions for submitting future quarterly requisitions.

Close adherence to these special instructions is imperative. Failure on the part of any postmaster to evaluate his postage stock needs and to submit requisitions as prescribed will not only delay receipt of his own supplies, but will also hamper efficient handling of all requisitions by RDPO staffs. Emergency requisitions must be limited to the absolute minimum.

Postmasters shall personally ascertain that procedures in this Bulletin are instituted and followed during the remaining portion of calendar year 1963, and continuing through June 30, 1964.—Bureau of Operations, 5–9–63.

Shipments from GSA

Numerous instances of duplicate shipments by GSA make it necessary to reissue the following information, originally published in POSTAL BUL-LETIN NO. 20316 dated July 12, 1962. More detailed procedures will be issued in the Postal Manual in the near future.

A. GSA Delivered Price Policy. All prices of items in the GSA stores supply system include the cost of surface transportation to any point within the continental United States.

B. Verifying Quantities Received. A packing list will accompany each shipment. As packages and cartons are opened their contents should be carefully checked against the packing list and the copy of the purchase order sent to your office to serve as a receiving report. Any damage, shortage, or overage in shipment discovered should be immediately reported to the GSA stores depot from which the shipment was received. The discrepancy should also be indicated on the receiving report furnished the Bureau of Finance.

C. Duplicate Shipments. Duplicate shipments of supplies and equipment have erroneously been made by GSA. There is no authority for postal installations to retain and utilize equipment or supplies covered by duplicate shipments. Such action is tantamount to the unauthorized procurement of supplies and equipment. Any duplicate shipment discovered should be immediately reported to the GSA stores depot from which the shipment was received.

D. Procedure for Notifying GSA. Correspondence in connection with paragraphs B and C concerning stock deliveries should be prepared in quadruplicate: original and one copy to GSA; triplicate to the Inventory and Distribution Branch, Procurement Division, Bureau of Facilities, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D.C.; and quadruplicate for your files. The following information must be included:

- 1. POD purchase order number.
- 2. GSA invoice or document number.
- 3. Federal stock numbers of items involved.
- 4. List of discrepancies, shortages and damages, if any.

Attention is directed to section 155.6, Postal Manual, covering construction and installation of this equipment, and to POSTAL BULLETIN, 20342, 12–27–62, covering replacement of old-type receptacle parts.

Buildings begun or remodeling started before January 1, 1963, may be equipped with mailboxes manufactured under specifications in effect prior to January 1, 1963.

Buildings begun or remodeled after January 1 must be equipped with mailboxes approved under the revised requirements as shown in sections 155.622 and 155.623a, Postal Manual.—Bureau of Operations, 5–9–63.

Commodities to be returned should be held in original shipping containers pending disposition instructions from the GSA stores depot.—Bureau of Facilities, 5–9–63.

Delayed Accounting for COD Mail

Under instructions in section 315.2, Postal Manual, a report is required to be made to the Inspector in Charge on Form 3859, COD Delinquency Report, where there has been a delay of more than 5 days in accounting for a COD parcel.

It is important for the proper control of the COD service that mailers be furnished supplies of Form 3859 and encouraged to report instances of delay in accounting for their COD parcels. Postmasters are requested to take positive action in this matter.

In processing returned Forms 1510 covering COD mail, a report on Form 3859 must be prepared when it is apparent that a delay of more than 5 days has occurred in accounting for the mail.

For the purpose of determining when a report is to be made on the basis of information on Form 1510, the transit time to the destination office and the retention time at the office of address must be considered.

It is not intended that postmasters will keep lists of mailers' prescribed retention periods. However, when it is known that the retention period is less than 30-days, this information should be applied in determining whether to use Form 3859. For the smaller mailers the retention period should be considered as 30-days, unless information is readily available showing otherwise.—Bureau of Operations, 5-9-63.

Holiday Service May 30, 1963

Memorial Day, May 30, falls on Thursday this year and shall be observed as a legal holiday.

No window service of any type will be provided. No city, village, or rural deliveries will be made. Neither city nor rural carriers shall be scheduled or assigned to case mail for the purpose of window delivery to patrons who wish to call at the post office.

Special delivery matter will be delivered promptly.

Holiday schedules for the receipt and dispatch of mail shall be observed. Holiday collections must be augmented as necessary to provide for the prompt and orderly movement of mail, with particular attention being given to maintaining adequate collections in business sections.

All eligible regular employees who perform service on Thursday, May 30, shall be granted compensatory time for such service. Eligible employees below PFS-8 shall be granted compensatory time within 30 working days. Eligible employees PFS-8 and above shall be granted compensatory time within 13 pay periods.-Bureau of Operations, 5-9-63.

Display the poster in a prominent location in the lobby as outlined in section 612.232 of the Postal Manual, from the date of its receipt for approximately 60 days.

Postmasters in buildings operated by the General Services Administration should submit the posters upon their receipt to the superintendent of the building.-Bureau of Facilities, 5-9-63.

Survey of **Housing Vacancies**

The Department has agreed to cooperate with the Federal Housing Administration in surveys of vacant housing units in selected areas of the country. Requests for surveys will be submitted in writing to the appropriate postmasters by authorized FHA representatives, with an information copy of each request to the respective regional director.

Housing vacancy surveys will require the recording of vacant dwelling units by city carriers on forms supplied by FHA and will be conducted at the convenience of the postmaster within reasonable specified time limits. Necessary instructions will accompany forms. Completed forms are to be returned to the appropriate FHA officials.

Upon completion of surveys, results will be furnished postmasters in summary form. Final reports are considered confidential information and are not to be released to the general public without prior approval of the Department.

These surveys are not expected to result in additional costs, and postmasters are cautioned not to authorize auxiliary assistance overtime in connection with this project.—Bureau of Operations, 5-9-63.

Customs Declaration Forms and Postage Missing

Many parcel post packages for oversea destinations are reaching exchange offices without customs declarations affixed. This necessitates holding the packages until the senders, many of whom are business concerns, can be contacted and asked to supply the missing tags, with re-sulting delay in dispatch of the parcels. Some of the parcels addressed to foreign countries are also found to be deficient in postage.

Postmasters will see that accepting employees require properly completed customs declarations to be securely fastened to parcel post packages addressed to ALL foreign countries, as well as to the Canal Zone (see section 125.74, Postal Manual) and to military post offices listed in Part 127 of the Postal Manual as requiring a declaration.

Every effort should be made to detect parcels lacking customs declarations or without sufficient postage before they are dispatched from mailing offices.—Bureau of Transportation, 5-9-63.
