20-Cent Audubon Airmail Postage Stamp

The 20-cent international airmail stamp will be first placed on sale at New York, N.Y., on April 26, 1967. This stamp is needed to meet the increases in the international postage rates that become effective May 1. It will cover the airmail postage, onehalf ounce, to Europe and Mediterranean Africa.

When the FTS network circuits are busy, long distance calls will be placed commercially by the caller and processed under section 632.341, Postal Manual.

To obtain first-day cancellations, collectors may submit requests to the Postmaster, New York, N.Y. 10001. See Postal Manual, section 145.2. The first-day covers will be canceled "Audubon, New York," a station of the New York post office. Selected mint stamps will be available at the Philatelic Sales Unit, City Post Office, Washington, D.C. 20013, on and after April 27, 1967. The Philatelic Sales Unit does not service nor sell first-day covers.

First- and second-class post offices requiring more than 3,000 stamps of this issue should immediately order minimum lots of 5,000, or the multiples in section 422.321, Postal Manual, submitting Form 3356 (USE ITEM 180) to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Washington, D.C. 20226.

Offices requiring 3,000 stamps or less should submit a separate requisition immediately on Form 17 to the accountable paper depository. Do not include stamps other than the 20-cent Audubon airmail on above requisitions.—Office of the Special Assistant to the Postmaster General, 3-30-67. Jet Airmail Service AM-8 On or after April 30, 1967, Delta

Airlines will inaugurate jet mail service at Montgomery, Ala. An official cachet will be furnished

for application to philatelic covers transported only on the first jet flight departing Montgomery. No directional service will be accorded. The covers will be backstamped at terminus of the flight.

The usual philatelic treatment outlined in section 145.5, Postal Manual, will be provided.

Patrons desiring to receive this cachet should send their covers in another envelope to:

First-flight covers should reach the office applying the cachet at least 5 days before flight date.

Covers already postmarked, those not properly prepared and those posted in the usual manner will not receive the cachet.—Bureau of Transportation and International Services, 3-30-67.

Monthly Consultative Meeting

During the March consultative meeting with the National Association of Postal Supervisors the following items were disposed of as indicated:

(1) Postal source data system.—Information is desired concerning the recording of time by supervisors under this system.

Disposition: No definite decision has been made. The National Association of Postal Supervisors' viewpoint will be considered.

(2) Quality steps for postal supervisors.—In some areas there is the thinking that supervisors should not receive quality step increases, whereas in others these are granted. NAPS would like a statement of policy on this subject.

Disposition: It is departmental policy that supervisors be recognized for quality step increases for outstanding efforts the same as any other employees.

(3) Surplus mobile unit supervisors.—It is the understanding of NAPS that the policy of the Department will authorize additional positions at stationary installations, to be reverted as vacancies occur, for the reassignment of excess mobile unit supervisors. NAPS would appreciate a confirmation of this policy.

Disposition: Additional temporary positions will be created to the degree they can be justified.

(4) Route inspection teams.— NAPS would appreciate information on the success of the pilot project in the San Francisco region and any plans for further implementation.

Disposition: There are plans to expand this experiment to three additional regions. However, the three additional regions have not been determined.

(5) Withholding of local income taxes.—NAPS proposes that withholding provisions be extended to provide for local income taxes.

Disposition: The Department stated that authority to withhold city income tax from employees' pay can only be obtained through legislative action.—Bureau of Personnel. 3-30-67. All City Delivery Offices

Misdelivery of Mail by City Carriers

In most instances, misdeliveries occur on routes where house numbers are the same on several streets served by the same carrier or where streets are similarly named and have like house numbers. Most misdeliveries are due to substitute and utility carriers and carrier technicians not fully knowing the conditions on the route to which assigned.

Postmasters shall take immediate action with carrier supervisors to arrange for verification, not less than once a month, of the accuracy of mail cased by substitute carriers, utility carriers, and carrier technicians. Additional verifications may be made where conditions warrant. Verification of distribution may be extended to include carriers regularly assigned to a route when complaints have been received on his route. Spot checks may be made as often as necessary. The selective check must be done without interfering with the carrier performing his duties.

Miscased Mail

Use Form 3966, Verification of Distribution Performed, suitably amended, for maintaining a record of carrier casing errors. Where checking reveals miscased mail, supervisors will find out the reason, such as incorrect or improper labels, insufficient training for substitutes, etc., and take necessary steps to correct the problem. In unusual situations, such as identical street numbers on adjoining streets, or similar street names, permission to use different colored labels may be requested from the regional office. Where checks disclose continued miscased mail after the above steps have been taken, counsel the carrier to achieve the necessary improvement needed to route mail accurately for delivery.-Bureau of Operations, 3-30-67.

The report shall list type and size of each bag lost or destroyed and the reason for destruction or loss.— Bureau of Transportation and International Services, 3-30-67.

Retirement—Involuntary Separation

Questions have been asked by employees about eligibility for retirement based on involuntary separation, section 723.23, Postal Manual.

Postal employees may qualify for this kind of retirement (1) if placement can be made only by demotion to a lower level position at the same location; or (2) if placement requires the employee to move to another postal installation with a change of headquarters beyond the normal commuting distance from his place of residence.

Application for Retirement

All postal employees are needed and are encouraged to continue their employment by change to another position when in excess of local needs. However, when for personal reasons an excess employee applies for retirement rather than accepting either a change to a lower salary level or reassignment to a different location, his application for retirement should be accepted and his resignation reported on POD Form 50, Notification of Personnel Action. Delivery of Business Reply Mail

Business reply mail must always be given expeditious handling and delivery as first-class mail. Business reply mail often consists of orders and other important business transactions which must be handled promptly.

Post offices must schedule employees to process business reply mail early enough in the day to assure delivery the same day. Sufficient assistance must be assigned to processing postage-due mail promptly, especially on Tour 1 on Mondays.

Users of business reply mail pay an amount in addition to the first-class rate to cover the additional costs of this service, and care must be exercised at all times to see that such mail is delivered on the next scheduled delivery after arrival in the post office. —Bureau of Operations, 3-30-67.
