8–Cent Willa Cather Commemorative Stamp

The 8-cent Willa Cather commemorative stamp will be first placed on sale at Red Cloud, NE 68970, on September 20, 1973. This stamp is the fourth of four in the American Arts series to be issued in 1973.

POSTMASTERS SHALL NOT PLACE THIS STAMP ON SALE BEFORE SEPTEMBER 21, 1973

To obtain firstday cancellations, collectors may submit requests to Postmaster, Red Cloud, NE 68970. See Postal Service Manual, section 257.2. Requests must be postmarked no later than September 20. Selected mint stamps will be available at the Philatelic Sales Unit. Washington, DC 20036, beginning September 21, 1973.

All classes of post offices will receive an initial supply of the stamps under the automatic distribution schedule.

First-class post offices requiring additional bulk quantities should immediately submit a separate requisition (Form 3356) to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing using item No. 487. As this stamp will be distributed in sheets of 40, orders shall be for quantities of 4,000, 8,000, 12,000, 16,000, 20,000, 40,000, 60,-000, 80,000, 100,000, and multiples of 100,000. Insurance Claim Procedure

Some postmasters have misinterpreted the intent of the verification of delivery procedure set forth in POSTAL BULLETIN 20938, dated August 2, 1973.

Numbered insured parcels involving APO's and FPO's should be sent directly to the respective port post office with both Forms 1510-A, Inquiry for the Loss or Rifling of Mail Matter, attached. The first copy of Form 1510-A for loss of numbered insured and COD parcels must be sent to the office of address for verification of delivery record. Forms 1510-A for unnumbered loss and damage claims should not be detached from the claim form.

Postmasters should review the insurance claim procedures set forth in POSTAL BULLETIN 20938 to effect timely settlement of numbered insured and COD claims.—Finance Department, 8-16-73.

First-class post offices requiring less-than-bulk quantities in addition to the automatic distribution and all other post offices may submit a requisition (Form 17) to their designated sectional center facility on their next scheduled requisitioning date.

In conjunction with the issuance of the Willa Cather stamp, the Postal Service will release a limited number of American Commemorative Series Stamp Panels. These panels, which measure $8\frac{1}{2}$ by $11\frac{1}{4}$ inches, are printed on a heavy art paper suitable for framing or mounting in an album. The panels sell for \$2 each.

Any sectional center which wishes to make these panels available may requisition a supply on Form 17, *Stamp Requisition*, from its accountable paper depository (in units of 10 panels or cartons of 100). Associate offices may requisition any required quantity from the SCF's designated to distribute accountable paper. The panels will be available on a firstcome basis from all distributing offices.—Stamps Department, 8-16-73.

If there is any uncertainty as to requirements for the Treasury Detment to pay an account, the postster should advise the claimant to te the Treasury Department, Buu of Accounts, for information.

f a person claims to have a postal ings account, but does not have certificates evidencing deposits, or uests information about an acnt as an entitled claimant, the tmaster should advise the person write the Treasury Department at above address for information and stance.

Money Order Swindle

Postmasters and window clerks are warned of several recent instances in which swindles have been perpetrated on postal employees by persons purchasing money orders in large denominations. When the purchase is made, the offender hands the employee a stack of bills and receives the money order(s). He usually indicates an intention to mail the orders uncompleted in order to conceal the identity of the sender. While the employee is counting the money, the purchaser pretends to place the money order(s) in a greeting card or other envelope. When the employee discovers that the money is short of the correct amount by a small sum, the swindler takes back his money and gives the employee the envelope to hold. He promises to quickly return with the needed additional money. The swindler never returns and the envelope, when examined, is found to contain a greeting card or a money order for \$2 or less.

Issuing employees are reminded that the total amount due for orders and fees should be collected and verified before orders are given to the purchaser.

If attempts to perpetrate such a swindle are made, employees should obtain description of the person and vehicle involved. Tag numbers, or other identifying data should be noted and the information immediately furnished to the nearest Postal Inspector.—Inspection Service, 8-16-73.

Third-Class Mail

In response to the needs of mailers, permission has been granted for them to address third-class catalogs and third-class tabloid advertisements in the following formats, on an experimental basis:

Mr. John Doe/or current occupant or

Mr. John Doe/or current resident, etc.

These formats are to be used in an effort to assure that the catalog or advertising tabloid will not be treated as undeliverable. It is the desire of the mailer that the pieces addressed in this manner be delivered to the cur-

U.S. Savings Bonds

Payroli Savings Plan

This is a reminder that the Treasury Department will require the social security number of the savings bond owner, or first-named coowner (e.g., the person named in the top line of the bond inscription), on all bonds issued on and after October 1, 1973. It is not mandatory to have social security numbers of beneficiaries or second-named coowners. For minors or other persons not having a social security number, application should be made with the Social Security Administration to obtain a number.

Use Standard Form 1192, United States Savings Bonds Authorization for Purchase and Request for Change, to furnish the missing numbers. If no other change is being made, check block D, Change Inscription, and annotate, SSN only. Missing social security numbers must be received at the postal data centers by September 28, 1973, to avoid discontinuance of savings bond purchases.

Over-the-Counter Sales

Bonds sold over-the-counter are subject to same requirement for social security numbers as those purchased through the payroll savings plan.—Finance Department, 8-16-73.

International Printed Matter

Effective immediately the notice concerning incoming international registered printed matter that appeared in POSTAL BULLETIN 20905, dated December 28, 1972, is amended to exempt incoming registered printed matter from Canada from being handled as certified mail. All registered mail received from Canada will be handled as registered mail in our domestic system.—Finance Department, 8-16-73.

Sale of Commemorative and Special Issue Stamps

The maximum length of time that clerks at regular stamp windows should stock a commemorative issue is hereby reduced from 90 days to 60 days. Only philatelic windows and postal stores which serve the special collectors market should stock commemorative stamps for a longer period. As a result of this new policy, postmasters should immediately evaluate their requirements for commemorative stamps and, if necessary, request a change in the quantity of stamps being received automatically. See instructions in section 222.63 Handbook F-1, Cost and Financial Controls.

Any stamps issued in 1971 or earlier should be disposed of in accordance with section 224.3, Handbook F-1.

Regular Stamp Windows

Postmasters should deplete their stocks of back issue (1972-73) commemorative and special issue stamps by selling these items at all stamp windows in lieu of regular postage stamps, unless the regular issues are specifically requested.

Philatelic Outlets

Postmasters operating philatelic windows and postal stores are again reminded that when commemoratives and other stamp issues are removed from sale at the Philatelic Sales Unit, the discontinued items should be placed on general sale at local stamp windows and stocks depleted within 30 days. Notice of the discontinuation of a commemorative or special issue is reported periodically in the POSTAL BULLETIN. Only the following commemorative and other postage stamp items currently remain on sale at the Philatelic Sales Unit:


HANDLE INDEMNITY AND CLAIM STATUS INQUIRIES PROMPTLY

Tag Fastener Use

Numerous hand injuries are increasing because of the improper use of stock item 0-407A, Tag Fastener. In 1972, employees of the Postal Service suffered 1994 cuts to their hands from postal operations. Postmasters are encouraged to notify all publishers in their area, whose publications are authorized to receive newspaper treatment and are using item 0-407A tag fastener with Tag 15, Time Value-Expedite, to attach them directly to the tie cord on the side of the pouch, not directly to the hasp or label holder.

The present tag can be attached directly to the hasp by making a loop in the sack cord and inserting it through the eye of the hasp above the tag. The other end of sack cord is then drawn through the loop. Both ends of the sack cord are then pulled in opposite directions, placing a very tight hold on the tag. This may satisfy many of the needs. The procedure is sketched below:

NEW HEALTH BENEFITS SCHEDULE

Effective July 21, 1973, the Postal Service's biweekly contribution for bargaining unit employees under the Federal Employees' Health Benefits Program is increased from \$4.04 to \$5.55 for self-only enrollment, and from \$10.17 to \$13.98 for a family enrollment. The Postal Service's contribution, however, cannot exceed 68.75 percent of the total cost of any type enrollment. The increase in the Postal Service's contribution to the cost of the health insurance program is based on section 1 of article XXI of the 1973 National Agreement.

A health benefits schedule showing the new employee withholdings and Postal Service (USPS) contributions is shown below. Changes in the withholdings and contributions for affected *bargaining unit* employees were first reflected in pay checks dated August 10, 1973.
